DOMINION PARLIAMENT.

Increasing Exports and Imports.

OTTAWA, May 21. Exports continue to show an increase, being \$11,983,000 for ten months over the same period of last year. The imports show an increase of \$314,000. Mr. Sproule gives notice of a motion for the abolition of Hansard. Yesterday the Opposition got a tremendous sickener. Hon. Mr. Foster made up his mind to secure the passage of a certain number of items in the estimates and he succeeded in having his way.

A STOLEN PRIVATE LETTER

Published by the Globe.

MONTREAL, May 21. Thomas McGreevy states that the private letter of Sir John Macdonald, published by the Globe, was not given to that paper or any one else by him. The general impression is that it was stolen by Bob McGreevy and given to Fraser.

Debt of Quebec.

QUEBEC, May 21. The financial statement brought down yesterday shows that the Province of Quebec has to face an annual deficit of \$1,040,000, and a floating debt of \$8,000,000 with a funded debt outstanding of over \$25,000,000. It is estimated that the liabilities of the province are \$33,750,000 with assets of \$11,500,000.

Fatal Hurricane.

LONDON, May 21. A despatch from Mauritius, says in the city of Port Louis alone, six persons were killed in the terrific hurricane that recently swept over the island. In various districts it is estimated an equal number of lives were lost.

Terrible Fire.

OSWEGO, N. Y., May 21. A great fire is raging here along the waterfront, sweeping through the line of grain elevators. The fireman can make little progress with the flames.

Dissolution of Parliament.

LONDON, May 21. It is stated that at a cabinet council held yesterday it was decided to dissolve parliament on the 20th June.

A Light Sentence.

NICE, May 21. Deacon has been sentenced to one year in prison for shooting Abiella.

Fatal Explosion.

MADRID, May 21. An explosion at a dynamite factory at Galdames killed eight persons.

Village swept Away.

LONDON, May 21. The village of Hanley, in Wiltshire, has been destroyed by fire.

General Telegraphic News.

LONDON, May 19.—Baron de Worms, parliamentary secretary of the colonial office, said in the House of Commons yesterday that the substance of the French shored bill had been agreed upon already by the Government and the Newfoundland delegates, when the delegates, Emerson, Morine and M'roe, left the country. The subsequent changes were unimportant, and were made in agreement with the two remaining delegates, Mr. Harvey and Mr. Whiteway.

LONDON, May 19.—There seems to be indications that Tim Healy's influence with the anti-Parallites is not so strong as it was. A significant instance of the change of feeling has been afforded by the fact that a number of questions which Healy had put on the notice paper have lost their place, owing to the fact that in his absence none of his former friends will extend the usual courtesy of asking them on his behalf. Sexton, who was loyal to Healy for a long time, is now thoroughly antagonistic to him, and William O'Brien has also shown that his leaning is against Healy's being allowed to further obstruct the path to reunion.

TORONTO, May 19.—The Empire's Ottawa special says the Dominion government has not been notified officially by the Newfoundland government that a modus vivendi with Canada has been determined. Pending further developments, however, the government cruiser Canadienne will be detained at Quebec. The cruiser was to have gone to the Canadian Labrador to prevent Newfoundland vessels plying their vocation in Canadian waters.

QUEBEC, May 19.—A terrible crime was committed last evening at St. Casimir, Portneuf, which may possibly prove to be murder. While on her way to the month of May services, with two other young women, Miss Gelin was attacked and struck with an axe on the head by a man named Lepierre, who was acting as escort to the girls, and who had been paying his addresses to Miss Gelin, but had been rejected. The girl is dying. The wound is a terrible one. Lepierre has been arrested. Jealousy is supposed to have been the cause of the crime.

KEOKUK, Iowa, May 19.—The Egyptian levee, which protects a vast area of bottom land, five miles below here, broke to-day. The waters of Des Moines river flooded the entire district. A high wind is prevailing, and will cause irreparable damage. The whole town of Alexandria, Mo., is submerged.
