

Fishing Plant Experts To Work At Souris

Three experts from the fishing plant at Queensport, N.S., were in Souris last week making final arrangements to join the staff of Griffin Fisheries Ltd. Headed by Mr. Reynolds, who has had 30 years experience, the men expect to return to Souris with their families at the end of this week. Two experienced engineers will join the party to set up the freezing plant which is now en route from the United States. Other experienced workers available for the new plant if required are 12 fish cutters and three skimmers. Minor skilled labor may also be secured from Queensport in the event of not having this type of worker available on the island. Six draggers similar in size and equipment to the draggers now working out of Souris will also unload at the Souris plant in order to keep it running and two other larger draggers of the "Caraque" type will also be available for unloading.

The small draggers cannot get through Carso and are not large enough to go outside and around Cape Breton, and their diversion to Souris will make it possible to

The guest speaker of the evening was Rev. D. Campbell of Montague who was introduced by Mr. C. Lelachour.

Mr. Campbell gave the interested audience some of his impressions of the Holy Land and other Far Eastern parts while serving in the R.C.A.F. It was in 1942 that he arrived in South Africa on the first leg of his journey. He touched on the South African racial problem which has become even more crucial in recent months. Egypt he defined as a country where the great mass of people are in poverty and ridden by disease. The Valley of the Nile is very fertile, but cultivated by obsolete methods. In Cairo, he was at first overwhelmed by impertunate storekeepers and shoe-shine boys who practically force their wares on strangers in the streets. Mr. Campbell feels that with the new government now in power, there should be a gradual improvement in the living conditions of the people of Egypt.

The ancient way from Jerusalem to Jericho Mr. Campbell found a very rough passage, the hazards increased by excited native drivers who often took both hands from the wheel to gesticulate. A small corner of the original garden of Gethsemane is preserved by monks of the Franciscan order. A ruinous inn called "The Good Samaritan" is still in evidence on the way to Jericho. From there Mr. Campbell crossed the Jordan and passed over the mountains where Abraham was buried. Through a troubled Trans-Jordan where the Arab Legion keeps martial order to Lebanon at the eastern end of the Mediterranean, and from there to Damascus. Here, on a street called Straight, Mr. Campbell saw the place where St. Paul stayed after his conversion, and which is now

TAUT, TIMELY "NIGHT PEOPLE" SHOWS POWDER-KEG BERLIN IN CINEMASCOPE

A taut, exciting melodrama about the intrigue that goes on almost every day between East and West Berlin and the powder-keg for danger it represents opens (today) at the Prince Edward Theatre. It is Twentieth Century-Fox's newest CinemaScope production, "Night People", which Nunnally Johnson wrote, produced and directed in Europe to make him one of the few triple-threat film makers on the Hollywood scene. Gregory Peck, Broderick Crawford, Anita Bjork and Rita Gam, the stars of this cloak-and-dagger thriller, a large supporting cast and a complete production unit went to Germany where the entire picture was filmed, being the first CinemaScope feature to be made on the continent.
