

Two Great Ball Players Named To Hall of Fame

 NEW YORK, Feb. 1 — (AP) — Two of the great all-time hitters of baseball—the late Harry Heilmann of Detroit Tigers and Pittsburgh's Paul Waner—were named yesterday to baseball's Hall of Fame.

Chosen by a vote of baseball writers, the outfielders became the 61st and 62nd to be enshrined at Cooperstown, N. Y.

Heilmann, four-time batting champion of the American League in the 20s, died last July in Detroit at the age of 56. He had spent the last 15 years broadcasting Detroit games.

Waner—"Big Poison" of the famous Pirates' brother team that won enemy pitchers through two decades—now is 50 and a resident of Sarasota, Fla.

Paul, three years older than brother Lloyd, led National League hitters three times, hitting .380 in 1927, .362 in 1934 and .373 in 1936.

During his big league career he poked out 3,152 hits—the only National Leaguer besides Honus Wagner to reach the 3,000 goal in what is regarded as modern times.

A total of 234 votes were cast by United States baseball writers with 75 per cent—or 176 votes—needed for election. Heilmann polled 203, Waner 195.

Heilmann, who starred for the Tigers from 1914 to 1929, had a lifetime major league batting average of .342.

Waner broke into organized baseball at the age of 20 in 1923 with San Francisco. He graduated to the Pirates in 1926, remaining there through 1940.

He spent stints with Brooklyn and Boston in the National League and New York Yankees in the American before hanging up his glove after the 1945 campaign. His lifetime batting average was .333.

Mountie Paddler On Olympic Team

REGINA, Feb. 3 — (CP) — A Mountie will paddle for Canada at the Olympic games in Helsinki, Finland, next summer.

Jim Nickel, 21, a serious young man at present training in Regina for service with the R. C. M. P., was named last summer with his partner, Bill Bridgen, 35, to represent Canada in the 10,000-metre double-blade tandem.

Canada's Olympic paddling team is expected to have a membership of eight.

Constable Nickel, a native of Winnipeg, said that he had qualified in three events but was allowed to enter only one.

The duo will race in a special 24-foot-long kayak imported from Sweden.

Since the summer of 1949 nickel and Bridgen have teamed up in paddle events and have won steadily.

In hockey, as in everything else, you can go quickly from the sublime to the ridiculous. The Summerside High School did just that last week. They surprised their most ardent supporters by holding the Freetown freebooters to a draw. The very next night they go gaily off to O'Leary and get trounced 19-4. And Freetown beat O'Leary 5-4 the only game they played with the Maroons. Of course, the Sum-Hi kids were without Garth Gay, the fellow who really puts the fence in the Summerside High School defence, and Neil Walker, who ranks as one of their best forwards. But 19-4!

He and Don Darby are the speed boys of the team, but while Darby attempts to skate around his check, Vance picks an open spot, if there is any, and goes straight through. Darby is a stickhandling specialist, Harris is not very adept at this form of attack as yet. But Harris' ability to shift into high in a split second, and his general aggressiveness makes him a cause for opposition worry at all times. Neither of these boys can outfox a goalie like their coach, Schurman.

A rather unusual situation arose Friday night when a Summerside goal was disputed by the Freetown team. The refs refused to disallow the goal, but removed the goal judge at Freetown's request. The referees backed the goal judge up in his decision, yet removed him from the game. Whether they did this because they didn't like the way he parted his hair, or for some other reason was not made clear. Certainly it is not wise to change officials every time a team registers a kick, but the referees in question are noted for their impartiality and general efficiency, so perhaps they had some good reason for the move.

Appointment Of Olympic Coach Stirs Up Storm

TORONTO, Feb. 2 — (CP) — Appointment of Bruce Humber of Victoria, B.C., as coach of Canada's Olympic track and field team stirred up a minor storm here yesterday.

Local coaches and officials praised Humber's ability but thought the honor should have gone to an eastern coach.

Lloyd Percival, director of Sports College, a nominee for the post said: "Naturally, I'm disappointed. However, I hear Humber is a nice fellow and I wish him luck."

Earl Deacon of the Queen City Spikes Club said: "Maybe Lloyd Percival struggled too hard at the job of trying to be named Olympic track and field coach. You don't make friends lobbying."

Percival called the "lobbying" statement "downright nonsense."

He said: "I haven't lifted a finger to try to get the job. Fred Foote of the East York Track Club brought up my nomination—much to my surprise. That's as far as it has gone with me."
