Grain Handlers Strike Averted

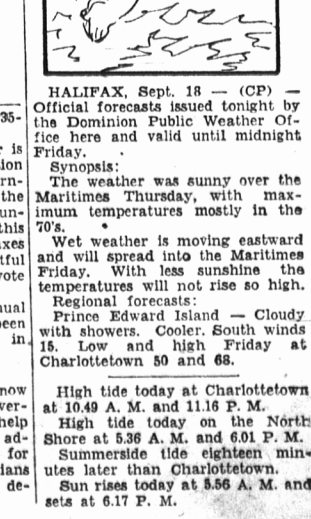
