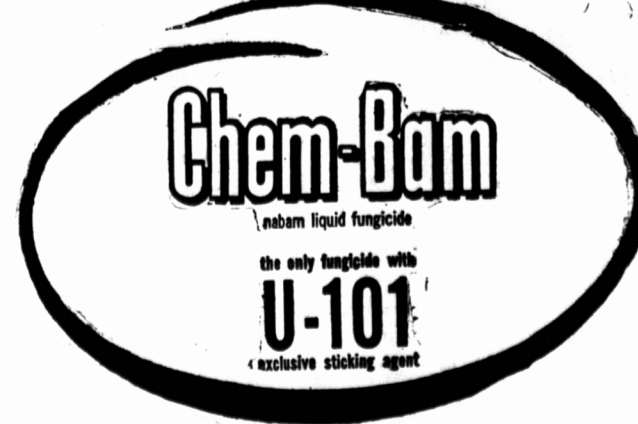

### 90th Annual Baptist Ass'n Sessions Open At Bedeque

The opening sessions of the 90th annual meeting of the Prince Edward Island United Baptist Convention were held yesterday, in the historic Central Bedeque United Baptist Church. The Central Bedeque United Baptist Church is the oldest Baptist Church on Prince Edward Island, having been organized in 1826 by the Rev. Theodore S. Harding. Yesterday's sessions were conducted by the Association Moderator, Deacon Charles S. Scranton Southport.

The major addresses of the morning session were delivered by the Rev. Henri Lanctin, Superintendent of the La Bonne Nouvelle Mission, Moncton, by Mr. Colin Waugh, representing the Social Service Board of the Maritime United Baptist Convention, and by Rev. H. H. Mitton, substituting for Dr. J. A. Clark, read the latter's report on the enterprises of Home and Foreign Missions. Dr. J. Murray Armstrong in a moving address outlined the program of the Maritime United Baptist Convention.
