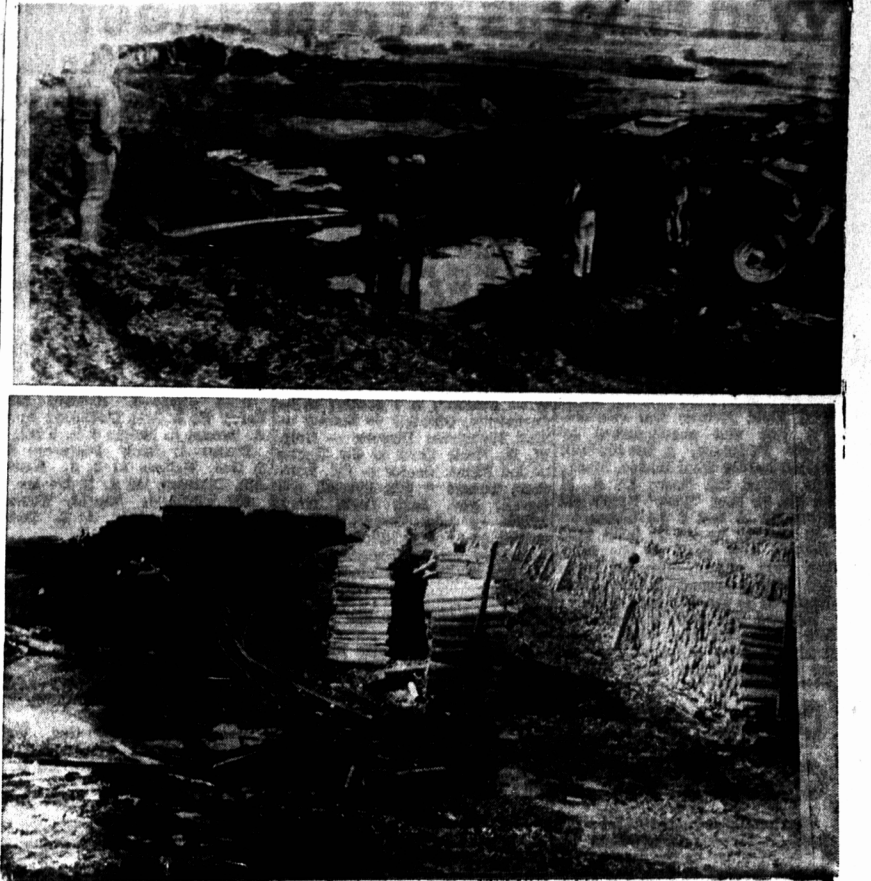


Scene Of Souris Pulp Yard Fire

Resolutions Adopted At Teachers Convention Here

Following were the resolutions adopted Friday at concluding sessions of the Charlottetown Rural Teachers Convention: Be it resolved that the thanks of this convention be extended to Dr. MacKinnon for the use of the auditorium, to Miss Bowness, Dr. Shaw, Mr. Rice, Mr. Ross, Mrs. Parker, Mrs. Baker, Mr. Malcolm MacKenzie, Mr. Hall, Mr. Pineau, Mr. MacDonald and all others who have in any way contributed to the success of our convention. Be it resolved that the Board of Governors supply song sheets to be used for future conventions. Be it resolved that all teachers take a firm stand on the matter of holidays thus doing away with fall holidays. Whereas Miss Bowness is overworked attending to Teachers Aid, be it resolved that there be a committee appointed to assist Miss Bowness. Be it resolved that the teachers of this group of Charlottetown Rural support the resolution of O'Leary group. Resolved that Easter convention concentrate to a greater extent on modern teaching methods there by taking on the character of teacher training periods, practical demonstrations, films, etc. Even if this entailed extension of the convention to a full week. Whereas it is the feeling of this committee that the salary committee is too representative of the City of Charlottetown therefore be it resolved that the newly appointed members of the Board of Governors request a new committee more representative of rural teachers. Be it resolved that the teachers of the Charlottetown rural, assembled in annual convention pledge their support to the Board of Governors in their efforts to improve the status of education in this Province and to bring to the proper authorities the inadequacy of the present salary scale for the teachers of this Province. Be it resolved that some special remuneration be given by the Government to teachers holding degrees. Be it resolved that future Charlottetown rural conventions be held on daylight saving time provided it is in effect in the City.
