Notes of the Week.

The suicide, during the week, of Francisco Barca, Spanish Envoy and Minister Plenipotentiary to the United States, was the result of pride and too high living.

The situation of the striking telegraphers remains unchanged, but the operators are ever hopeful of the difficulty being eventually concluded.

The writer of this letter is a Roman Catholic, born in the Faith, and with God's help will die in it. I am prepared to support any political party, whose Government conduces most to the welfare of the Dominion at large.

Poor Webb! In his death he was not wise. But he has proved beyond a doubt that no living thing can pass through the Niagara whirlpool.

As a result of our examination I am led to the conclusion, and in this I am seconded by my colleagues, that death was caused not by asphyxia or drowning or by any local injury by the body coming in contact with any hard substance.

The horror of the week occurred at Ischia, an Island of the Mediterranean, about seventeen miles west of Naples. Between 4,000 and 5,000 persons were killed.

We have to acknowledge the receipt, during the week, of a large amount of correspondence on the question of patronage raised by the Herald.

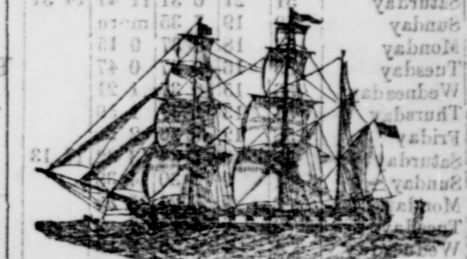
