## Ambulance Service Cost Is Increased At Meeting

At a meeting of the Prince Edward Island Funeral Directors and Embalmers Association held at the Charlottetown Hotel recently, a general discussion took place pertaining to the ambulance service on Prince Edward Island.

During the discussion it was pointed out that a great many funeral directors and embalmers in other provinces, whose business firms provided an ambulance service to the public, were giving this service up and ambulances were being provided by private concerns or through hospitals.

The high cost of maintaining and buying vehicles for the ambulance service came up for much discussion as did also the extra equipment such as oxygen tanks, first aid supplies and other accessories that are necessary for ambulance work and which are quite costly items.

It was decided, after much discussion, that the ambulance service would be maintained, for the present at least, but that the prices on the ambulance calls would have to be adjusted to meet with the rising costs of maintaining this service.

It was unanimously passed at the meeting that the price for ambulance calls, as of November first, would be seven dollars for local calls plus an additional fifty cents per mile, one way, for all calls outside the limits of the ambulance concerned.

There was also much discussion on the subject of ambulances being called to accidents. It was decided that this matter would be taken up with the proper authorities and a committee was appointed to look after same.

## \$10 Penalty Handed Out

A fine of \$10 and costs or five days was imposed upon Joseph Walter Callaghan, Charlottetown, when he appeared before Magistrate A.J. Haslam, QC, in City Police Court Saturday morning

on a charge of disorderly conduct (street fighting).

A one-year suspended sentence was handed out to Wayne Blaquiere who had previously pleaded guilty on the charge of causing damage to property.

Reginald Morrison, Charlottetown, charged with having a dog barking, causing annoyance to neighbors, had his case adjourned until October 8, and the case of Brian David Foley charged with failing to yield right of way was also adjourned until October 8.

Margaret MacDonald, Charlottetown, charged with false pretense had her case further remanded until October 8.

## TRAFFIC OFFENCES

Donald Warren Cudmore, Charlottetown, was fined \$5 and costs or two days when he pleaded guilty to failing to stop at a stop sign. George A. MacDonald, Rosebank, David Walker, Charlottetown; Joseph Herbert Murphy, Georgetown; George Sullivan, Eastern Passage, N.S. and Charles M. MacEachern, Belfast, all pleaded guilty to charges of failing to stop at the stop sign and all were given fines of \$5 and costs or two days by Magistrate Haslam.

Donald B. Connell of Summerside was fined \$20 and costs when he pleaded guilty to a speeding charge and Leo J. Hayes of Vernon River received a fine of \$5 and costs or two days when he pleaded guilty to going to wrong way on a one-way street.

Four men appeared on charges of being drunk and incapable or drunk and disorderly and two were charged with illegal possession of liquor.

## Pekinese Wins Top Award In Dog Show At Coliseum

"Best in show" is the top award at a dog show, and the holder of that honor from Saturday's sanction show at the Coliseum in Charlottetown, sponsored by the Abegweit Kennel Club, is a Pekinese named "Santan Penelope" owned jointly by Mrs. Pat Mabon and Mrs. Pius Sullivan of Lancaster, N.B. That was the first time Penelope was ever in a show ring. Mrs. Mabon handled the nine-month-old puppy in its debut.

The prize for the best island-owned dog in the array of 53 entries has been won by a German Shepherd called "Kosy Korner Newo," owned by Danny Johnson of Tea Hill and shown on Saturday by Warren Hood, N.B. DOGS

About a score of New Brunswick dogs competed with island dogs in Saturday's show, which was judged by Gerald McCarthy of Saint John, director of the Canadian Kennel Club for Prince Edward Island and New Brunswick, was present at the show and donated the prize for the best island-owned dog. The show superintendent was Frank Brown of Charlottetown, and the ring steward was Mrs. Arlene Hood of Charlottetown. Show secretary was Mrs. Rosemarie MacLean of Bonbury.

Under Canadian Kennel Club regulations, with the completion of Saturday's sanction show following a similar one last July 9, the Abegweit Kennel Club now qualifies to put on a championship show in which points awarded to the dogs will count towards championship status in each breed. The local club plans its first championship show for July 9, 1967, according to club officers, thus joining the Maritime dog show circuit which attracts dogs and their owners from Quebec and Ontario and the eastern United States.

In Saturday's show, the New Brunswick Pekinese also carried off awards for the best Canadian-bred dog in the show and best Canadian-bred puppy.

The sporting group was won by a Labrador Retriever owned by Dr. Angus MacLeod of Bonshaw. Second in the group was an American Cocker Spaniel owned by Harold Clements of West Royalty.
