

Holman's Edge Junior Abbies 3-2 In Baseball League Game Yesterday

Holman's Intermediates made their season's first start in Charlottetown a winning one yesterday afternoon as they came up with a run in the ninth inning to edge the Junior Abbies 3-2 in an Island League baseball thriller at Memorial Field.

Veteran Charlie Deighan, well known Summerside hockey and baseball player, socked a sharp line drive into left center to score Allison Farmer from second with the winning run in the top of the ninth after two men were out.

Deighan's line drive broke up a brilliant pitching battle between Joe Bernard of Holman's and Donnie MacLean of the Abbies. Each hurler surrendered only six hits over the nine inning route, although both were tagged for a home run.

The win moves Holman's into a second place tie with the R.C.A.F. in the Island League. Each team has six points, one more than the Junior Abbies.

The Abbies went into a 1-0 lead in the third inning and for a time looked as though the lead would hold. MacLean held Holman's scoreless for seven innings but in the eighth the Summerside players went into the lead as the result of an error and a fluke home run.

The Abbies tied matters up in the last of the eighth as Charlie Kennedy led-off with another fluke homer. The score stood at 2-2 until Deighan and Farmer broke it up in the ninth.

Farmer, Holman's centerfielder, got to first base on an infield error. He raced to second on a passed ball and came home when Deighan stroked an 0 and 1 pitch into the outer gardens.

Cliff Ready scored the Abbies first run when he was hit by a pitch and tripled home by Donnie MacLean. Syl Bernard homered for Summerside with Garth Gray on base to account for Holman's two runs in the eighth.

Bernard and Charlie Kennedy came through with home runs under almost identical conditions. Both drives into right field were good for doubles but both times the ball went through the wire and before it could be recovered the runners were home.

MacLean was never touched for more than one hit in an inning, while Bernard gave up two hits only in the eighth. A feature of the pitching duel was that neither hurler issued a walk.

The hardest hit ball of the game was Joe Coyle's triple into right field in the sixth inning. Coyle, however, died on third.

Donnie MacLean also hit a three bagger.

Syl Bernard made the nicest fielding play when he robbed Cliff Ready of a hit in the seventh inning. Bernard went far to his left to snag Ready's hot grounder.

Two women participated in the shoot. They were Miss Elsie Strong of the Nova Scotia team who had an aggregate of 99 and Mrs. Ruth Mitchell of the New Brunswick team who had an 85.

Trophies were presented to the winners at a dinner held at the Kappooch Beach Hotel on Saturday night. The dinner, tendered by the P. E. I. Rifle Association, was presided over by Brigadier W. W. Reid. The trophies were presented by Andy Gunter, Capt. of N.B. team, and they included the cup for the winning team along with trophies for each member of the team.

It's quite a while in a baseball way of thinking until September rolls around but Holman's Intermediates demonstrated yesterday that they like the old proverb, "History repeats itself." In September for the past five years, Holman's or the Summerside Intermediates have won the Island Intermediate baseball title. In many of those years, they had the material to win Maritime championships which is what they did. Last year they were weaker than they had been on previous years but they still won the Island title. This year Joe Bernard and Co. were reported to be scouting Prince County for anything that looked like a ball player in order to get into the Island League.

There were even strong reports going the rounds that Holmans might drop out of the League last week. But it would appear from yesterday's game that as long as Summerside has anything to stand behind Joe Bernard's right arm, they can still field a good intermediate team. From time to time there have been reports that Bernard "is over the hill," or "has lost his speed" but always it seems Joe, like Bob Feller, comes back and gives a warning that the writers can forget about his athletic obituary.

Joe gave such a warning yesterday. The Junior Abbies, who are a fair hitting club, could do little with his offerings. Big Joe Coyle hit high and far for a long triple and Donnie MacLean came through with another triple while Charlie Kennedy and "Duck" MacLeod hit the ball far enough for doubles although Kennedy got a home run thanks to a fortunate bounce. That was about all they got and the four hits were good for only two runs. Neither MacLean, Coyle or MacLeod ever saw home plate for Joe bore down and left them on the base paths. Bernard still had his high hand one and its still good enough to take out a lot of over-anxious batters.

Joe gave a vote of thanks to his battery mate, Charlie Deighan, for winning the game. Charlie Deighan has played a lot of baseball and hockey on the Island and as long as we can recall he has always been a top-notch performer. There was hit written all over Charlie yesterday afternoon when he came to the plate in the ninth inning with two out and Allison Farmer on second base with the tie-breaking run. We can't remember seeing a baseball player stepping into the batters box with as much determination to get a hit as Charlie showed yesterday in the ninth. He missed on his first strike, took about four quick cuts through the air to warm up for the second pitch and when it came he drilled it into the outfield to send Farmer home with the winner. Those are the pats that separate the men from the boys.

Not all the tributes on yesterday's game belong to the Summerside Intermediates by any means. Donnie MacLean pitched every bit as good a game as Joe Bernard, probably even better. Holman's got only one earned run off Donnie and that was Syl Bernard's homer. Actually it should never have been a home run. The ball landed in right field but bounced through as it hit the wire and then it itself hit Syl hit the ball hard enough for a double and that was all. Strictly speaking MacLean did not allow an earned run. Another fellow who gave an improved performance is Forbes Kennedy. Young Forbie looks better with each passing game and yesterday we thought he handled MacLean very well.

In the four games that Ev. MacNeill's Juniors have played, they have given a good account of themselves and have provided fans with a lot of top-notch baseball entertainment. Three of their games have been decided by one run decisions and the other has ended in a tie. What more could a person ask? After losing several of the best players they were regarded as underdogs in the League but so far they have shown that they are fighting underdogs who have their sights on a play-off position. If they keep playing ball the way they have been they'll make it too.

In several places we have referred to the home runs of Syl Bernard and Charlie Kennedy as flukes or cheap homers. We don't want to take anything away from these players but we would like to point out that they were fortunate in getting their round trippers. Both boys deserved doubles on their hits. Bernard's ball landed on the track in fair territory and by a lucky stroke of fate bounced through a hole in the wire fence and got lost. Kennedy hit one in almost the same place and his bounced over the fence and rolled under the grandstand. In most places they would be classed as ground rule doubles but yesterday by agreement of

White Sox Split Twin Bill With Yankees; Take Over Second Place In A.L.

Chicago's sizzling White Sox took over second place in the pressure-packed American League pennant race today by splitting a doubleheader with the front-running New York Yankees.

The Yanks, behind the two-hit pitching of Bob Kusava, won the opener 3-0 but the Sox bounced back to take the nightcap 2-1 to the delight of 49,970 fans, largest crowd of the season in Chicago.

Boston Red Sox tumbled to third place by dropping a twin-bill to Cleveland Indians 7-0 and 5-4. The White Sox now trail the Yanks by two games.

Washington's fifth-place Senators remained five games off the pace as they halved a bargain bill with St. Louis Browns, winning the first game 4-5 but losing the second 2-1. Philadelphia Athletics and Detroit Tigers also divided a doubleheader with the Tigers taking the 12-inning first game 4-3 and the A's the second 10-0.

Rain curtailed action in the National League. A single game between the league-leading Brooklyn Dodgers and Pittsburgh Pirates and a doubleheader between the runner-up New York Giants and Chicago Cubs were washed out.

The fourth-place St. Louis Cardinals captured a twin bill from the Boston Braves by identical 7-2 margins. Cincinnati Reds and Philadelphia Phils split with the Reds winning the first game 5-3 and the Phils the second 3-0 in a game called after seven innings because of darkness.

Kusava and Chicago's Billy Pierce pitched scoreless ball for six innings but Yogi Berra broke up the duel with a two-run homer in the seventh to win the game.

Mary Grissom, 34-year-old shop-worn right-hander, turned in his fifth straight triumph in the second game shading rookie Bill Miller. Former Yankee Sherm Lollar drove home both Chicago runs on a fly ball in the sixth and a double in the eighth. Mickey Mantle homered in the seventh for New York's lone tally.

Steve Gromek and Mike Garcia pitched out of the Red Sox at Cleveland. Gromek came up with a two-hitter in the opener while Garcia scattered eight hits and fanned 11 on posting his 10th triumph in the second game.

Gromek was forced to bow out in the ninth when his right shoulder stiffened and Mickey Harris finished the game.

Brooklyn trounced Pittsburgh 14-4 in the only Saturday night game. The Dodgers sent 15 men to bat in a nine-run eighth inning. Gil Hodges started the Dodger scoring with his 13th homer of the season.

Cincinnati and Philadelphia were rained out and an American League game between Philadelphia and Detroit was washed out in the fourth inning with the Athletics leading 4-2.

Randy Gumpert turned in his first victory for Washington in stopping the Browns in the 12th game at St. Louis. Dick Kryhoski and Cas Michaels honored for St. Louis. Less Moss singled home what proved to be the winning run for the Browns in the sixth inning of the second game.

Pinch-hitter Vic Wertz singled with the bases loaded in the 12th to beat the A's in their first game against Detroit. Bob Newsum, making his first appearance for Philadelphia, was the loser and Hal Newhouse the winner.

Carl Scheib blanked the Tigers on seven hits in the second game. Gus Zernial, who homered in the opener, drove home four runs on a pair of homers and three singles to lead the A's 15-hit attack. Art Houtenauer was charged with his 10th defeat, high for the majors.

Veteran lefthanders Al Brazle and Harry Brecheen pitched the Cards to victory over Boston. The Cards clinched the opener with five runs in the ninth and wrapped up Brecheen's first victory of the season with four runs in the first inning of the nightcap. Stan Musial of the Cards hit safely in each game to extend his consecutive hitting streak to 19 games.

The Reds broke a 3-3 tie in the first game at Philadelphia when former Phil Andy Seminick doubled with the bases loaded in the ninth. The Phils scored all of their runs in the seventh of the second game on six hits, a walk and error in an American League action Saturday, left Chuck Stobbs turned in his first complete game of the season Saturday, pitching the White Sox to a 6-1 victory over the Yankees.

The Red Sox knocked off Cleveland 3-1 and Ned Garver recorded his third straight victory and fifth of the season as the Browns downed Washington 7-3. St. Louis wrapped up the game in the sixth with a six-hit attack.

In the National League Saturday, lefty Dave Koslo turned in a great relief job as the Giants defeated the Cubs 6-2. Koslo took over in the second after starter George Spencer developed a blister on his pitching hand. He checked the Cubs on seven hits.

Rookie Wilmer (Vinegar Bend) Mizell pitched his best game of the season for the Cardinals, who defeated Boston Braves 9-0. The southpaw gave up four hits, fanned 11 and walked six.
