to have your lads alongside of us on the Chingui Road."

Announcement of the Canadian decision on Brigade group was received at the front via the Pacific edition of Stars and Stripes, American Army newspaper which carried the despatch from Ottawa on the front page.

I telephoned Tokyo and spoke to Lieut. Gen. Sir Horace Robertson, Australian commander of the British Commonwealth occupation forces in Japan. He said: "I am delighted to see that Canada will be represented alongside other members of the Commonwealth in this campaign."

Pushing Commonwealth Scheme

The scheme for creation of Commonwealth divisions or small corps in Korea is now being pushed hard. British battalions will probably arrive from the United Kingdom or the Middle East in a month or so and Australian and New Zealand perhaps a bit later. They will get final training in Japan and the possibility is seen that while it is announced it takes six months to train a Canadian brigade, only preliminary training will be carried out in Canada and combat instruction will be done in Japan with other Commonwealth units.

In all likelihood Robertson will command the Commonwealth force. He is experienced in the Far East theatre and any way Australians would probably not accept any British commander.

Robertson is keen on having British type weapons used by any Commonwealth force which means Canadians would not have to change to American weapons.

Robertson also said: "We realize Canada is already in this effort with airlift transportation, planes and three destroyers, and additional assistance of a brigade group is most welcome."

Premier Robert Menzies of Australia is scheduled to arrive in Tokyo within a week from a trip to North America and he will likely carry with him tentative plans for a Commonwealth division, or Corps for discussion with Robertson and MacArthur.

Odds at present heavily favor this project and in every way it seems the best manner in which to link together Commonwealth effort.

Confusion and Muddling

After seeing practically all the Korean front and visiting all the American divisions in use, I feel that well trained Canadian troops will conduct themselves well here. At present there is a lot of confusion and muddling. Mistakes are being frequently made on the command and frontline level but it is inevitable considering the greenness of American units first thrown in here piecemeal, and the precipitate manner in which the invasion of South Korea took place.

By the time the Canadians arrive some real organization will likely have been achieved, and the Americans will be building up in a massive way for an attack to destroy the North Korean forces.

But from officers I talked to it will be wise to get the Canadians at training bases in Japan as quickly as possible—perhaps within six weeks or two months—for, in fact our contribution in ground forces might suffer if they don't show up in the Far East around the same time as other Commonwealth formations.

There are excellent camps here for this purpose and the Canadians would probably get as good instruction as they would receive at Petawawa, Shilo or Wainwright. (Copyright Southam News Service)

Kell Continues Out in Front in American League

CHICAGO, Aug. 8.—George Kell, Detroit third-baseman, and Larry Doby, Cleveland outfielder, each gained two points last week in their race for the American League batting lead.

Kell remains out in front with 144 hits in 408 times at bat for .353. Doby has .350 on 116 hits in 331 times at bat.

Other leaders in the batting averages through Sunday's games include Bill Goodman, Boston, .344; Walt Dropp, Boston, .332; Al Zarilla, Boston, .329; Johnny Pesky, Boston, .328; Yogi Berra, New York, .323; Phil Rizzuto, New York, and Johnny Groth, Detroit, both .320.

Drops leads in the important runs-batted-in department with 106. Team-mate Vern Stephens leads in runs, with 90. Kell has the most hits at 144 and the most doubles, 32. Bobby Doerr, Boston, and Gene Woodling are tied in triples with nine each.

Al Rosen of Cleveland, with 29 home runs, leads in that department. Dom DiMaggio of Boston has the most stolen bases, 15.

Paul (Dizzy) Trout of Detroit leads the pitchers with an 8-2 record for an .800 average. Bob Lemon of Cleveland leads in strikeouts with 106.

Helicopter Lost On Arctic Trip

OTTAWA, Aug. 8 — (CP) — A helicopter attached to the Canadian Government Steamship C. D. Howe has been lost in the Arctic with the loss of one man. Transport Minister Chevrier announced yesterday.

Sam Ford, 70, of St. John's, Nfld., attached to the Government's Eastern Arctic Patrol, was lost Saturday when the helicopter plunged into the Kaksook River near Ungava Bay on the far northern shore of Quebec.

Two other men in the helicopter were rescued when the machine crashed just 15 seconds following a takeoff from the ship, making her maiden voyage on the Eastern Arctic patrol.

Those saved were Pilot Charles Parkin and G. Johnston of Ottawa.

The accident occurred as the plane took off from its special platform on the Howe's deck for a 16-mile flight into Fort Chimo.

The C. D. Howe, first Government vessel to carry its own helicopter, was engaged on the Government's annual trip with stores for Arctic posts. She was completed only a few months ago to replace the Nascope, wrecked in Hudson Bay three years ago. She sailed from Montreal July 17.
