

Poulton In 10-Round Split Decision Over Johnny "Kid" Adshade

GLACE BAY, N. S., Sept. 22 — Harry Poulton of Charlottetown tonight belted out a 10-round split decision over Johnny "Kid" Adshade of Glace Bay to win the Maritime welterweight boxing title. It was a dull bout for the 1,900 fans in Miners' Forum, highlighted by continual clinching.

Poulton used a long left lead to great advantage, while tying up Adshade effectively in the infighting.

Both judges gave the nod to Poulton by a respectable margin while referee John MacLean called the fight a draw. Judge Mathias Gouther scored it 7-2 with one even. Judge Joey Burchell gave the Charlottetown fighter six

Indians Within Single Game Of N.Y. Yankees

CLEVELAND, Sept. 2 — (AP)—Cleveland Indians gained a half a game today in their desperate bid to qualify for the American League-leading New York Yankees by trimming Detroit Tigers 6-3.

The victory boosted the Tribe to within one game of the Yankees. It was the sixth straight win for Cleveland, the 15th victory in the Indians' last 17 starts. It was the only game scheduled in the Major Leagues.

The smallest crowd in six years — 3,954 — watched Early Wynn check the Tigers on five hits for his 23rd triumph.

It was the seventh straight victory for Wynn and his ninth in a row over the Tigers, who haven't beaten him since Sept. 6, 1950. He struck out seven to tie Alie Rivers of the Yankees for the league lead in strikeouts at 153.

Both the Indians and Yankees now have won 90 games, but the Indians have lost 60 — two more than New York.

If New York wins four of its remaining six games, the Indians would have to win all of their remaining four to gain a tie.

The Indians got three runs in the third on doubles by Bob Avila and Larry Doby, a wild pitch by Vespri Trucks and singles by Rosen and George Strickland.

Two walks and an error in the sixth tallied what proved to be the winning marker. Wynn and Dale Mitchell drew passes and the pitcher ran across the plate when rookie Harvey Kuenn fumbled a slider by Avila.

The last two Indian runs came in the eighth when Avila tripled, Doby singled and Luke Easter doubled. Johnny Groth lost Avila's blow in the sun.

The win completed a sweep of a four-game series for Cleveland. Two of Cleveland's remaining four games will be played here against Chicago. The other two will be at Detroit.

New York plays three at Boston and three more at Philadelphia.

Sportsmen Plan Meeting On Ferry Friday Evening

Next Friday night the Maritime Wild Life Federation will hold their third annual meeting on board the Car ferry during the late afternoon and evening runs as was the case last year, when the get-together proved so popular.

The meeting will be presided over by the President, Mr. W. A. Fox, with whom the Provincial Presidents of the Fish and Game Associations of the three provinces are associated as an executive.

The original Association consisted of member organizations in the Counties of Nova Scotia and New Brunswick bordering on the Northumberland Straits, along with the Island. However during the past year the entire provincial bodies in both N. S. and N. B. have signified their intention to be allied with the Maritime Federation, and the enlarged organization will elect officers and do business on this basis at Friday's meeting.

A large delegation of fish and game adherents from the New England States have signified their intention to be present, and exchange views which their organization hold on many subjects of common interest.

Each province will provide two speakers at the meeting, which will also be attended by at least one Cabinet member from each, if arrangements under consideration can be carried out. Mr. Thomas Logan, Biologist from the Department of Natural Resources here, will be one of the Island speakers, and possibly Mr. Wilfred Saunders, officer in charge at the Ellerslie Brook plant.

The Charlottetown group will leave from in front of Robert Simpson Ltd. on Kent Street at 3 P.M. Friday and catch the 4.30 boat at Borden, having supper en route to the mainland to pick up the delegates from that side. County presidents and secretaries who will be in attendance are, King, Judge Sylvester DesRoches, president; James Cudmore, secretary; Queen's, E. K. MacNutt, president; Peter E. Rogers, secretary; and for Prince, Omar Bernard, president; Norman MacLeod, Jr., secretary. Sportsmen desiring to attend the conference should contact the secretaries.

Chamberlain Agrees To Coach Islanders; Start Made In Picking Team

"Charlottetown will have a hockey team and a fighting one in the Maritime Major Hockey League this year."

This clear-cut statement was made last night by 'Murph' Chamberlain, a few hours after he had accepted an offer to coach his old club the Islanders, this coming season.

Not overlooking any bets Chamberlain wants it known that any Island-born player, who thinks he can make the grade with the club is invited to turn out for the training sessions when they start in October. All that a candidate needs to do is to turn up at the Forum with his hockey equipment.

Good local talent, Murph believes is invaluable to a club if it measures up to the standard of hockey played in the league. At any rate he made it quite clear, that Island players will be given every opportunity to catch on with the "Islanders," and none will be dropped from the squad until given a thorough try-out.

Marciano Is 3 To 2 Favorite To Take Title From Jersey Joe Tonight

PHILADELPHIA, Sept. 22 — (AP) — Young Rocky Marciano rules a 3 to 2 choice to wrench the world heavyweight title from 38-year-old Jersey Joe Walcott tomorrow night in the same Municipal Stadium where Gene Tunney upset Jack Dempsey just 28 years ago.

Co-promoters Jim Norris and Herman Taylor expected a crowd of 50,000 and a gate between \$550,000 and \$600,000 for the biggest heavyweight promotion since the Joe Louis-Walcott return.

The weather forecast calls for a cool, cloudy day with temperatures in the 60s.

There will be no home television or radio of the bout, scheduled 10 p. m. EDT. However, a record number of some 50 theatres in 31 cities will screen the show on a coast-to-coast theatre television network.

Like Tunney-Dempsey this too is a battle of youth against a veteran. But this time it's the 28-year-old challenger who weaves out of a Dempsey-like crouch against a boxer-puncher champ.

Few expect this contest to go the 15-round limit for each man packs a KO punch in either hand. In fact, they're betting about 2-1-2 to 1 it won't go the route.

Can Marciano take it? Will Walcott's legs stand up?

Those are the key questions in this second defence by Jersey Joe of the title he won from Ezzard Charles in 1951.

Walcott's camp insists Marciano's concrete-faw never has been fully tested. They run down his perfect record of 37 knockouts in 42 straight wins by rapping the opposition. Joe Louis, they claim, was only a name when the Rock knocked him into retirement. Harry Matthews, they say, was only \$25, \$15, \$10. General admission \$5.

Dodgers Have Good Chance Of Clinching N.L. Pennant Today

BROOKLYN, Sept. 22 — (AP)—Brooklyn Dodgers have a good chance to clinch the National League pennant tomorrow — sitting down.

Needing only one more victory or one New York Giants defeat, to qualify for the world series, the Dodgers will sit out an afternoon Giants-Boston doubleheader before playing a two-night twin bill with Philadelphia.

Should the Giants lose one of the two games with the Braves, pressure immediately would be taken off Brooklyn's manager Charley Dresen, who could then start resting his weary pitching staff for the series, starting Oct. 1, against either New York Yankees or Cleveland.

If the Giants win, clinching ceremonies for the Dodgers would be delayed until they can win one of their six remaining games.

"Monte not only helps with his bat, he's an inspiration to the other players on the team."

Irvin, a standout in the 1951 World Series, broke his right ankle sliding into third base during a spring exhibition game in Denver. He was lost to the team for three-fourths of the campaign.

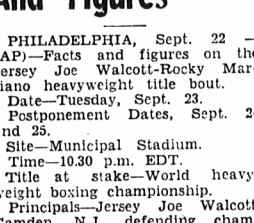
