The scores have been generally below the average. In the Nursery match Lieut. J. A. Longworth was among the prize winners. In the McDougall match Lieut. J. A. Longworth and Sergt. Allen secured places in the Rideau match Sergt. Younker and Lieut. Longworth won five dollars each. Sergt. Johnstone and Lieut. J. A. Longworth obtained places in the Col. Ounmet match, at 900 yards, and Lieut. R. V. Longworth won five dollars. In the Manufacturers' match, finished this evening, Sergt. Younker won five dollars and Sergt. Johnstone four dollars. The grand aggregate will be made up to-morrow.

The Artillery Competition.

OTTAWA, Aug. 31. The annual meeting of the Dominion Artillery Association opens on Monday at IsleD Orleans, near Quebec. The Governor General will be present part of the time. Artillerymen are grumbling at the small grant by the Government, \$2,000, which always falls short of expenses, while the Dominion Rifle Association gets \$7,000. Another cause of complaint is that passes are refused over the Intercolonial, while riflemen from the Lower Provinces, attending the Dominion Rifle Meeting at Ottawa get passes whether they are volunteers or not.

State Fair at Bangor.

BANGOR, Me., Aug. 31. Fifteen thousand people attended the fair grounds to-day, and the hall shows gathered in their thousands as well. A feature that attracted much attention was the baby show, where 47 darlings were on view. Each infant got a prize, and there were specials for the heaviest and lightest, the handsomest, a colored baby and twins.

Notes from Emerald.

Harvesting operations are in full blast. The weather is favorable, crops excellent, and the farmers hearts are glad.

Mr. Bernard Crocken, proprietor of that popular summer resort, "The Seaside Hotel," has been laid up for a few days with erysipelas in the hand. We hope to see him restored to health and usefulness in a few days. He has lately added a number of improvements to his establishment.

Mr. Terrence Goodwin, proprietor of the Emerald Carriage Shop, has also been adding to his already well equipped establishment. He has invented a new system of covering roofs with which he expects to revolutionize the building industry in the future.

Mr. Francis T. Murphy, of the Emerald Boot and Shoe Factory, who also does a general auctioneering and commission business, is about starting a reading room, etc.

Mr. W. H. Haslam, our new merchant, is doing a stirring business.

Our popular and genial doctor is now adding a new wing to his residence. John H. Perkins, of Albany, is the architect. Robert H. Muford, of Bradalbane, is the contractor. When completed it will be a great improvement to the village. He has also erected a balcony in front of his office. Craig & Haslam are getting in their fall stock, and are evidently preparing for a big rush this fall.

Agriculture in the United Kingdom.

One of the peculiarities of this season is the shortening of the period which usually elapses between the commencement of cutting the crops in the early and late districts respectively. The explanation is that no corn has been able to keep green long after earing under the influence of the hot drought, which has been only broken by a few showers since the 4th of June. There has been a good deal of premature ripening to bring crops in districts where harvest is usually quite a month or six weeks behind that of the south of England pretty well abreast with the earliest, and while wheat has not suffered much by the hastening process, except on light soils, barley and oats have been badly injured. From all parts of the Kingdom reports are favorable in respect of wheat, while barley, oats, beans and peas, except on rich, heavy soils, are all by common consent more or less below average. It is supposed that the wheat area is fully equal to that of last year, and that the yield will be at least thirty bushels per acre, or two bushels above the "ordinary average" of the United Kingdom. Last year the wheat area was 2,355,451 acres, and if it is about the same this year we may expect a crop of something like 71,000,000 bushels, or nearly 7,750,000 bushels more than that of 1886. Some estimates will probably be higher, but there are such very poor crops on light land that the average will be brought down materially by their deficiency. A good many samples of new wheat of varying quality, some weighing 53 to 64 pounds per bushel, have already been shown in the markets, and if the present weather lasts the whole crop will be fit for immediate use, and no doubt a good deal of it will be hurried into market. The price is not tempting, being only 30s. to 33s. per quarter for red and 32s. to 35s. for white, but there is reason to fear that there will be a fall before a rise occurs, and numbers of farmers are compelled to realize quickly.
