

Miners Outplay Moncton Hawks For 5-2 Victory

GLACE BAY, N.S., Jan. 30 — (CP) — Bud Poile's youthful Glace Bay Miners defeated Moncton Hawks 5-2 tonight in a game that produced what might easily be the goaltending feat of the Maritime Major Hockey League.

Don Lockhart, in the Moncton goals, handled 51 shots riddled at him by the eager Miners, who remained in a third-place tie with Halifax St. Mary's.

The game was cleanly-played with only two penalties being handed out after a hustling first period.

Hub Macey and John Anderson were Glace Bay's marksman with two goals each. Pete Wywrot got the other. George Scholes and snipper Filion scored Moncton's tallies.

Moncton opened the scoring early in the first period but goals by Macey and Wywrot put Miners in the lead, and they never looked back.

Time after time Glace Bay forwards roamed in Moncton territory, top-hammering shots at Lockhart but he wavered only under impossible shots during the onslaught.

Bob Arnel handled 18 shots in the Glace Bay nets.

Moncton made their attacks count, with each organized sortie into the Glace Bay zone usually producing a goal. The second period ended with Moncton trailing by one goal.

Anderson scored his second goal

at the 12 second mark of the third and Macey came through with his other tally at 11:58.

General manager Frank Lane announced that Marvin Grissom, a pitcher, and Rocco Kranich, third baseman, agreed to terms via long-distance telephone.

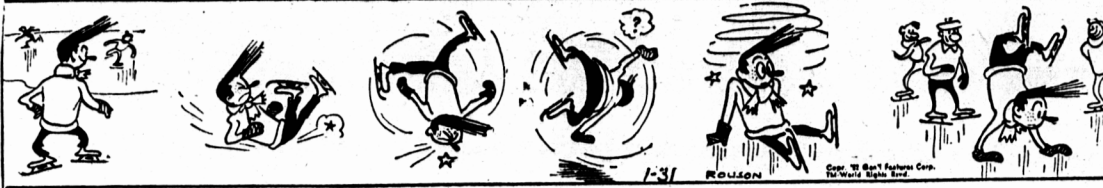
Tryon Arrows Win

Let them go and they always come back to haunt you, is a saying well worth remembering when it comes to hockey players. The latest player to bear out the truth of this statement is little Hal Gordon, late of the Islanders and now with the Beavers. Last night Hal came up with his first shut-out of the 1951-52 season and it had to be against the Islanders, the team for whom he was playing less than two weeks ago.

Fate plays strange tricks on people in general and athletes in particular on certain occasions. Three weeks ago Hal Gordon stated that the best game he played this year was against the Beavers when the Islanders defeated the Saint John team 3-1 here last fall. Now we wouldn't be surprised to hear Hal Gordon stating that last night's shutout over the Islanders was one of the biggest thrills he received since he came to the Maritimes last year.

Hal very probably would not call last night's performance one of his best games. He had only 15 shots to handle in comparison to 51 by his opposite Ray Frederick in the Islanders end of the rink. In the first period alone Frederick had 38 shots. Ray must have turned in a hot performance to stop 46 of the 51 drives labelled at him and his work wasn't made any easier by the severe facial cut which he received in the second period. He returned to the ice, however, to stop the Beavers cold the rest of the way.

It's hard for a team to catch a breather in this league. As a result of last night's games the Islanders are only three points ahead of both the pesky Glace Bay Miners and the Halifax Saints. The Beavers, who have been taking things easy since the opening of the year, saw their lead dwindling to nine points and have now apparently decided to put the pressure on the teams who are nearest to them. The game here Friday night should be a thriller and it's one the Islanders will want to win for more than purposes of revenge. Another Islanders win this week would insure them of maintaining their hold on second place and from then on the going might be a little easier.

According to the Canadian Press reports of last night's game at Saint John there were feelings of contempt toward one another and toward the referees. The referees, of course, always come in for feelings of contempt. George Hayes, N.H.L. linesman, who conducted the hockey school here last December, stated no man had ever referred a perfect game of hockey. "If you find one, put him in a glass cage," advised George. "because there will never be another."

Sometimes the referees deserve the contempt they receive. Had the referees Tuesday night treated the Islanders as they did the Halifax Saints they would have been booted out of the rink. Why the referees will permit players to push them around is something that is hard to figure out. The C.A.H.A. rulebook says that a misconduct penalty may be imposed on any player who shows disrespect or who persists in disputing the ruling of an official.

The referees have the toughest job of anybody on the ice. Their only reward is the paycheck which comes each week or every two weeks. There is nobody around after the game to clap them on the back and say "you were good out

Beavers Blank Islanders 5-0 In Penalty - Packed Game At Saint John Last Night

SAINT JOHN, N.B., Jan. 30 — (CP) — Saint John Beavers blanked Charlottetown Islanders 5-0 tonight in a rough, penalty-packed Maritime Major Hockey League fixture characterized by ill-feeling between the teams and toward the referees. Paid attendance was 1,578.

Pete Langelle, Ken Watson, Carl Smelle and Bill McCracken scored in the first period. Al Buchanan ended this phase of the proceedings late in the second.

Beavers again stretched their lead over the second place Islanders to 11 points. Charlottetown coach Leo Lamoureux was banished from the rinkside in the middle frame after first shoving and then punching referee Gerry Mathieu. The argument concerned a decision over an allegedly led puck.

It developed from Buchanan's goal. He scored a rebound with the help of McCracken and Watson. Charlottetown claimed an icing the puck infraction but the official ruling was that Watson had touched the rubber first, thus nullifying an iced puck.

The Island goalie, Ray Frederick, needed a six or seven-minute repair job in the second period after stopping a shot with his face.

The first misconduct of the night went to Don Bellringer early in the first period. Another Islander, Walter Pawlyshyn, and Johnny Ubrico, of Saint John, received match misconducts in the last session for arguing with and pushing the referees.

Beavers had a decided edge in the play. They shot the first goal while shorthanded and the third was when Charlottetown was short a man.

Halifax St. Mary's Hit Stride Again With 8-3 Win Over Sydney Team

HALIFAX, Jan. 30 — (CP) — Halifax Saints hit the victory trail again tonight after two straight losses, whipping Sydney Millionaires 8-3 in a ragged Maritime Major Hockey League game.

Saints built up a two-goal cushion in the first period and were never behind in the close checking game that produced few thrills for the slightly more than 3,000 fans who attended.

Ed Millonaires played their best hockey in the early minutes of the second period but back on a semi-defensive style in the last half and the game bogged down again.

Saints, playing their third game in three nights, were faster on the attack but their sharpest players were dulled by the heater skelter pattern of the Mills.

Davey Thompson, one of the Halifax stars, shot two goals and played an outstanding game both ways. Bob Drainville, after a pair of off form contests, turned in a sharp defensive game and shared top honors with Thompson. Other Halifax riflemen were Joe MacArthur, Billy Warwick, Bob Bowness, Hughie Campbell, Pete Leswick and Billy Watson. Bowness had two assists to bring his point total to three for the night and Johnny Morrow came in with three assists. Warwick also had a brace of assists.

Dunc MacIntyre played one of his best games on Halifax ice, scoring two goals for the Sydney club and making strong bids each time he was on the ice. George Robertson was the other Sydney sniper.

Each goalie made 24 stops but Sydney's Cliff Hicks had by far

the toughest assignments with the Saints making most of their tries camped on his doorstep.
