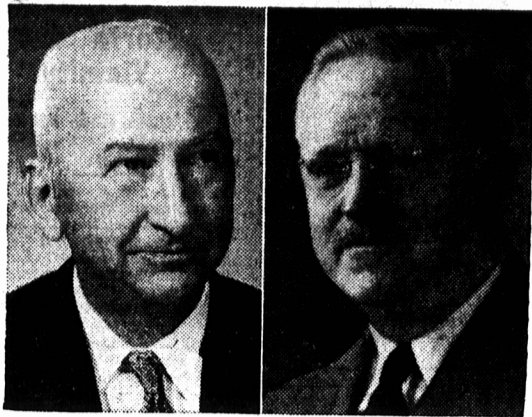


Golden Wedding
