TIGNISH — Thomas LeClair, highly respected and well known in the Tignish area where he clericed for 40 years at the firm of Myrick and MacIntosh prior to his retirement seven years ago, died suddenly from a heart attack at the home of his son Rev. Joseph LeClair of South Ruston.

He and his wife had been residing there since his retirement. He would have celebrated his 80th birthday the following day. They celebrated their 52nd wedding anniversary in February.

S' side Fur Ranch Finds Mink Disease

Dr. C. K. Gunn, director of fur animal research located at the Dominion Experimental Fur Ranch, Summerside, has solved the most serious disease in the mink ranching industry in Canada, the U.S. and European countries, that of the "Wee Belly Disease". The disease causes pigmentation in the leather of mink pelts and greatly devalues them. It has been under investigation in the mink ranching industry for some 15 years but was thought to be a nutritional disease, but experimental work at the Dominion Experimental Fur Ranch, begun in 1960, showed it to be an infectious condition. During the past three years further experiments conclusively proved it is not a nutritional condition and confirmed its infective nature.

IST CONTROL EVER — This was the first time in the world that a complete control was found for this disease and this, plus other knowledge gained at the Summerside station, augurs well for a control of this disease in the mink ranching industry. Four American scientists gave excellent reports on their work on wet belly disease in respect to different incidences of the disease in relation to special diets and other interesting factors, but they unanimously agreed the work at the Canadian station had solved the direct cause of wet belly disease. The work reflected credit on the Canadian Department of Agriculture and especially on the staff of the Fur Ranch at Summerside, where all its members took part in solving this difficult disease of international interest.

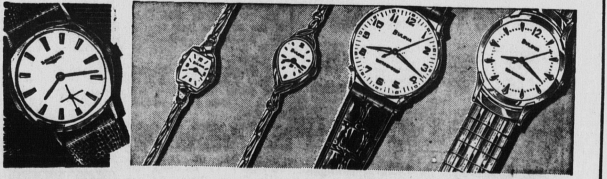
