Supreme Court Hears Appeal By 'Witnesses'

OTTAWA, Dec. 9 (CP)—The Supreme Court of Canada today was asked to declare that Jehovah's Witnesses form a religious denomination, entitled to the same freedom as other denominations.

The request was made by W. Glen How of Toronto, counsel for the Witnesses, while arguing against the validity of a City of Quebec by-law under which members of the Witnesses have been prosecuted for distributing tracts.

The case deals specifically with Laurier Saumur of Quebec, a Jehovah's Witness evangelist arrested for distributing literature without a permit from the chief of police.
