

Halifax Juniors Hammer Charlottetown Royals 11-4

CHARLOTTETOWN (CP) — Bobby Whitlock returned to his home town Thursday night to lead visiting Halifax Canadiens to an 11-4 exhibition hockey victory over Charlottetown Royals.

Whitlock, son of Charlottetown's Roy (Buck) Whitlock who set many scoring records in Maritime professional and senior hockey, scored four goals as Canadiens won their 22nd game in 23 starts this season. They have lost two and tied one.

Canadiens, a Junior team, completely overpowered the intermediate Charlottetown team, outshooting the Royals 55-16.

Whitlock, whose father was known as "The Old Lamplighter" during his high-scoring days of the 1940s and 50's, is the Canadiens' leading scorer and his slick work around the net was in evidence here. He scored twice in the first period and twice in the third and also picked up an assist.

Bobby Sheehan and Bob Bossy had two goals apiece for Halifax. Others were scored by Fraser Rice, Errol Thompson and Fred Sinclair.

Stan Pearson led the Royals with two goals while Alfie Flanagan and Gordon Whitlock — Bobby's cousin — had the others.

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Nationals Face Royals Tonight

SUMMERSIDE — Borden Legion Nationals and Summerside Pope Aces tangle here tonight at 9:15 p.m. in a regularly scheduled contest of the Island intermediate hockey league.

Summerside were scheduled to play in Charlottetown last night against the high-flying Royals but the game had to be postponed because of the rescheduling of Wednesday's game between Halifax Junior Canadiens and Royals.

Borden and Summerside met twice this year, with the Nationals coming off with an 8-0 win in the league opener, and the Aces holding on for a 6-7 win in the second meeting.

This, in other words, is the rubber game of the season thus far, and the winner will gain more than prestige, since second place is at stake. Both teams have two points, although Aces have a game in hand.

The closeness of the first pair of games will certainly bring many supporters of both squads flocking to the rink.

If both teams could do as well against Royals, the league would be very tight. Borden were snowed under, 8-0, 11-5, and 15-4, in their clashes with Royals, while

Summerside took it on the chin twice, 10-3 and 8-0.

That jinx won't be facing them tonight and could mean one of the better games will be witnessed by local fans. Both Gary Campbell in the Borden cage and Gerard Smith for Pope Aces should be ready for another busy night in the cage as a wide-open style of hockey is expected to materialize.

The three-team league winds up the first part of its schedule next week. Charlottetown's Sandy's Royals play Summerside Pope Aces here Tuesday, Borden visits Charlottetown at the Forum Wednesday, and Summerside hosts Borden on Friday.

It is expected that Dave Gaudet, home from Hamilton, Ontario, will line up with Tim MacGuigan's Aces tonight. The rightwinger arrived in Summerside this week.

In individual statistics, released yesterday, Gordie Whitlock of Royals had 12 goals and 9 assists for 21 points to lead the points race. His 12 goals is tops in that department as well. Alfie Flanagan, also of Royals, has 20 points, one ahead of Pearson and Lawlor, who have 16. Lawlor leads in the assists department with 15.

Detroit Shuts Out Bruins; Keeps Boston On Slide

DETROIT (AP)—Andy Bathgate, in his second game back since a two-week suspension to the minor leagues, fired two goals Thursday night and Roger Crozier was brilliant in goal as Detroit Red Wings beat Boston 4-0 in a battle of talented National Hockey League clubs.

Parker MacDonald and Ted Hampson scored the other Detroit goals as the last-place Red Wings stretched Boston's winless streak to 10 games and climbed one point behind the Bruins.

All four of the central figures for Detroit have had tough slodging at one time or another this season. Hampson and MacDonald both began the season in the minors and Bathgate was sent there to regain his shooting eye.

Crozier, benched twice during the season for ineffective play, was brilliant against the Bruins, making 21 saves and chalking up his third shutout of the season in his New York's Ed Giacomin for the NHL lead.

Crozier's toughest stops were on Joe Watson and rookie Jost-Peal Parize in the third period, both of them diving saves, and on Pit Martin's break-in opportunity.

MacDonald scored his second goal in four games since being recalled from Pittsburgh at 6:53 of the first period, seven seconds after a penalty to Boston.

The Royals were missing Angie Carroll, but they have much more depth than the boys of the car-terry town, and Carroll, who is admittedly a fine hockey player, wasn't missed too much. The "Irish" line of Alf Flanagan, Diddie Doyle, and Mike McKinnon gave the production line a run for honors, scoring six goals in seven for the other two. Both Doyle and Whitlock had hat tricks. Elton Ellis played exceptionally well for Borden, also getting a "hat trick". Don "Hoss" Chandler, big Royal defenseman, made his long shots count, getting two goals. A hockey stick was broken in the process of being wrapped around Chandler's neck, and he scored two knockdowns in retaliation, but when he was told it was an "off balance" accident, "Hoss" cooled off and skated buddy-buddy with his arm around the stick wielder.

Upland Game Problem Remains To Be Solved

UPLAND GAME PROBLEM

Sir,—My reason for writing this letter is simply because I am a hunter and I am a member of the Minister of Industry and Fisheries law firm not to answer a letter written to him on this subject October 17th.

Some people forget that it takes a long time to get elected and probably a lifetime to get re-elected.

For years, I paid a dollar to hunt when there was something to hunt but, last fall, I paid six dollars to hunt when there wasn't anything to hunt but birds put out in the morning to be shot in the afternoon.

Last fall for the first time in six years we had an open season on Hungarian partridge, we were asked for a wing and where the birds were shot. Anyone would know if a whole covey was shot, that only two birds would be over six months of age and as to where they were shot, this tells nothing as partridge move around a half mile radius all day, eating one place, sleeping another and dusting in a third. The only information gained would be the sex of the birds and the fact that they were very scarce. While they were at it, a complete stomach examination should have been done to find out the effect of insecticides and the diet on these birds.

Personally, I feel that the decline of horses and interbreeding has done more to delete our upland game than any other factor.

Several years ago, I suggested to Charles Bartlett that we pay farmers \$5.00 a pair for trapped partridge in the winter. They could be sexed and separated, except for the old pair and in March or April a female from Prince County would be placed with a male from Kings or Queens, etc., and these birds put out into areas that we know have been excellent areas for the raising of partridge in the past. Even a hundred pair would be a start for restocking; but Mr. Bartlett who is more interested in his Wild Life Park than biology facetiously remarked that a hundred pair would be a drop in the bucket.

Since we have more and more people with more and more money, spending more and more money on sport, it is time the Government spent more time and money on upland game to try to make these leisurely hours a little more attractive. They worry more over migratory birds, over which we have little control — there are over fifteen million gunners in the United States and a half a duck each would be given and a half million ducks — than they do over upland game. \$500 for a hundred pair of partridge might be a small drop in the bucket, but it would at least be a start. One does realize when one is talking with Government, one shouldn't be naive enough to talk in hundreds.
