Two Farm Buildings Burned At Springfield

Two farm buildings owned by Mr. George Dunning, Springfield, about seven miles from Kensington, were destroyed by fire about 2:30 yesterday morning. Origin of the fire is unknown and it was not discovered until the reflection of the blaze awakened one member of the family who was sleeping in a room on that side of the house. By that time it was too late to save the buildings which were a barn and a granary.

Two other buildings were saved and the house was not threatened. It was a calm night. In the barn, eight pig-pens and a threshing machine and crusher, all of which were lost. Destroyed with the granary was about 150 bushels of oats from last year's crop. The barn was about 40 by 30 feet and was of the underground type. No estimate of the loss could be obtained but it is understood that there was some insurance on the building.

Plan Battle Of Britain Program At Summerside

On next Sunday wherever the Royal Canadian Air Force is stationed a solemn program will be carried out in honor of Battle of Britain Sunday. This observance takes place every year at this time in honor of those gallant few airmen who fought the numerically superior German air force over Britain in 1940 and earned from Churchill the immortal tribute that "Never in the field of human conflict has so much been owed by so many to so few."

The Summerside Station will play its part in the commemoration of this historic event by a program to be held in town which will include a parade of 400 officers and airmen and a fly-past by 12 aircraft. The observance will start at 2 p. m. with services at St. Paul's Roman Catholic Church and the Presbyterian Church. These will be followed by a ceremony at the war memorial when an address will be given by the commanding officer of the station, Wing Commander D. A. Willis, D.F.C. and wreaths will be placed.

The final act of the program will be a march-past with the salute being taken by His Honor, Lt. Governor T. W. L. Prowse. The Summerside Legion Band will head the parade.

S'side Minister Accepts Call To Kentville

Rev. Kenneth G. Sullivan, who has been pastor of Summerside Trinity United Church for the past ten years, has resigned effective November 1st, to accept a call to the United Church at Kentville, N. S. An announcement to this effect was made last evening by the official board of the church.

Rev. Mr. Sullivan came to Summerside in July of 1941 and the following year was given leave of absence to join the Royal Canadian Air Force as a chaplain. After three years service he returned to Summerside and has been here since that time. He is a native of Halifax and attended the Halifax Academy and Dalhousie University where he obtained his Bachelor's and Master's Degree in Arts. Following this he attended Pine Hill Divinity Hall where he was granted the degree of Bachelor of Divinity. Since Mr. Sullivan's arrival in Summerside, Trinity United Church has seen much advancement both in the membership of its congregation and in the material property of the church.

In the last few years a new basement for a Sunday School was added to the church and an addition has just been completed to the church hall. He is at present chairman of the Christian Education Committee of the Maritime Conference of the United Church of Canada. Mr. Sullivan is married and they have two children. Prior to coming to Summerside he was in Canning, N. S., for a short time.

S'side Man Testifies At Bathurst Trial

BATHURST, N.B., Sept. 11 - (C.P.) A grand jury in the Gloucester circuit court today returned a true bill in the case of J. Ennis McLean, Moncton, charged with manslaughter after Miss Alphonse McGraw, a Tracadie school teacher, died May 23 following a high-way accident near Tracadie.

Dr. J. E. Paultin, Tracadie, said a head injury was the cause of death. The only other witness before adjournment of court until tomorrow was P. Roy Pidgeon, of Summerside, P.E.I., Moncton-employed salesman who accompanied McLean as the latter drove a truck at the time of the accident.

Pidgeon said McLean was telling him how to fix a window on the truck's right door when the vehicle travelling between 40 and 50 miles an hour, swerved to the road's shoulder and then crossed to the left shoulder. McLean had said he had struck a girl. They stopped and gave what help they could.

The court opened with Mr. Justice W. Arthur I. Anglin presiding. Patrick P. Harper, Bathurst, appeared for the Crown and R.D. Milton, K.C., Moncton, represented McLean.

Meetings Conclude

This service marked the close of a three-week series of revival meetings conducted by Rev. Elmer Crockett of Worthington, Minnesota, a former Island boy.

The first week's service was in the Montrose Church, the second was in the Elmsdale Church and the third week was in the Bloomfield Church. Some thirty-five people, many of them young folk, found salvation at these meetings.

The two United Church Ministers, Rev. J. M. Sheen of Elmsdale and Rev. W. G. Dickson of O'Leary assisted at the services.

The choirs of the various churches provided special music and there were a number of special solos by Alban Craswell, Fred MacMillan, and duets by Rev. Mr. Sheen and Rev. Mr. Crockett, etc.

On Sunday morning, Sept. 9th, Rev. Mr. Crockett spoke in the O'Leary Church, in the afternoon at Montrose, and in the evening at Elmsdale, thus concluding his series of services in West Prince. He then left for Hampton, P.E.I., and Montague, P.E.I.

Kensington Town Council Meeting

The regular monthly meeting of the Kensington Town Council was held on Monday night with Mayor Darrach presiding and the councillors present. Routine reports were submitted by the various councillors in connection with their respective departments.

Councillor Davison of the street committee reported that the work of paving the three streets would be completed in one more day and the citizens in general appeared pleased with the paving work undertaken by the council. On motion it was decided to pay 4-1-2 per cent on 20 year debentures to pay for the street paving programme.

A bye-law was passed which had been introduced by Councillor Champignon concerning the prohibiting certain types of vehicles in the town limits which would be injurious to the paving.
