Primrose Man Heads Island Ayrshire Breeders Club

Mr. Lloyd MacLeod, of Primrose, King's County, was elected president of the Prince Edward Island Ayrshire Breeders' Club at a well attended annual meeting held at the main office building of the Experimental Farm yesterday. Mr. Heber MacPhail, New Haven, was elected vice-president and James Nicholson, Charlottetown, secretary.

Directors for the coming year were as follows: King's County Lloyd MacLeod, Primrose; Prince County, Mr. Edward Boswell, Victoria; Queen's County, Heber MacPhail, New Haven. Directors at large: Messrs. Gavin Reid, Montague; George Boswell, Frenchfort; Fred MacRae, Central Royalty and John Lewis, Freshout. Almon Wood was named a delegate to the Canadian Ayrshire Breeders' Association annual meeting which is expected to be held this year in Toronto. Major MacRae was named alternate delegate. The retiring president, Mr. W. F. A. Stewart, M.L.A. presided.

A great deal of the discussion at the meeting, which commenced shortly after 10 a.m. and finished at 4 p.m. centered around the advisability of holding a stock sale some time next spring. Mr. Gavin Reid thought it would be a good thing and would enable a number of the breeders to improve their herds by adding some top notch stock. He was emphatic that the stock offered for sale should be of the very best quality. Major MacRae expressed his approval of the sale and added that any animals offered, should be a credit to the breed.

Mr. H. W. Clay cautioned the meeting that the sale would serve no useful purpose if the breeders were to use it as a means of disposing of their unwanted stock. He said it would only tend to give the breed a bad name. The matter was left to the directors.

Commends Fine Showing

Mr. W. R. Shaw, Deputy Minister of Agriculture, addressed the meeting briefly. He was warm in his praise of Keith Boswell and Son who made such a fine showing

at the Royal Winter Fair. Mr. Shaw described the Ayrshire show as "magnificent," and was glad to see a man of such courage as Mr. Boswell and his son, who took a chance by taking their herd for the first time among such high class competition. He noted that out of 11 entries, Mr. Boswell was able to bring home 10 ribbons in classes which in some cases contained 47 entries. Mr. Shaw described Boswell and Son's exhibit as "a credit, not only to themselves but to the Province."

Speaking of departmental grants, Mr. Shaw made it clear that the Department did not in any way

wish to dictate the expenditure of this money but would be pleased to see the major part of it used for the purchase of some high class bulls which he believed were possible to obtain within the Province. However, he would suggest the procuring of such animals, even though it would be necessary to go to Upper Canada for them. Mr. Shaw felt that some of the money would be wisely spent in extension work and suggested that some of the directors or other qualified person should spend a portion of their time in promotional efforts on behalf of the breed.

Mr. H. W. Clay, of the Federal Department of Agriculture, noted that his Department was and would still continue to be one of the best buyers of bulls that the club had. Mr. Clay offered the assistance of his office in the selection of the proper type of animals.

New By-Law A new section was added to the

constitution and by-laws of the Club. It reads as follows: "The directors shall act as the extension fieldmen of the club. It shall be their duty to see that the object of the club as outlined in Article II, is carried out. They shall personally contact prospective new breeders and members."

Mr. R. C. Parent, superintendent of the Dominion Experimental Farm, who was at the meeting for only a short time due to his being required to catch a plane for the mainland, reported on the bull bonus policy. He explained that at a directors meeting it was decided to discard the bull bonus policy in effect the previous years and to use the money for the purchase of a couple of top notch bulls. He described the experiment being presently carried out at the Farm, in which the records of the various bulls were being kept in so far as their heifer offspring were concerned up to three years. When a bull was found to be producing

consistently good stock over a period of years, that was the animal to be recommended for use in the Club. He stated that no results from this experiment would be available for at least another year. The 4-H Calf clubs came in for some discussion and reference was made to the fine showing of Sterling MacRae who topped all the Junior Calf Club members at the Maritime Winter Fair. The Club voted generous assistance to these 4-H Clubs. At the noon recess members assembled at Birch Court where they were served a bountiful dinner by the Parkdale Women's Institute. A welcome guest at the dinner and at the sessions was Mr. Howard Trueman, prominent Ayrshire breeder from Point de Butte, N.B. Mr. Trueman, who is also a director of the Canadian Ayrshire Breeders' Association, expressed his pleasure at being present and on several occasions entered into the discussions.
