One Fined \$15 In Traffic Case

A fine of \$15 and costs was imposed upon Robert A.J. MacDonald of Charlottetown when he appeared before Magistrate A. James Haslam, QC, yesterday on a charge of driving without due care and attention.

Also appearing in city police court on a similar charge was Allan Willard MacKinnon, Canoe Cove, who had his case adjourned until August 28.

John Perry of Sherwood was assessed \$10 and costs or five days plus a drycleaning bill on a charge of splashing a pedestrian while a similar fine was handed out to David Judson, Alexandria, for failing to stop at a red traffic light.

There were three cases of illegal possession on this morning's docket. Two were each given similar fines of \$20 and costs or 30 days while a third had his case adjourned till August 28.

Two city residents were charged with being drunk and incapable. One man was fined \$20 and costs or 20 days while the second was assessed \$10 and costs or five days.

One Charlottetown resident charged with being drunk and disorderly was remanded without bail till Aug. 28.

Leonard Joseph Dangle, Saint John, N.B., charged with obtaining food without bail till September 1st.

Everett Ferguson, city, charged with illegally selling liquor to another person had the charge withdrawn by the RCMP and was then charged with the lesser offence of illegal possession, had his case adjourned till Aug. 26.

Pasture Improvement Needed To Halt Dairy Production Drop

Unless Island pastures improve significantly during the rest of the grazing period, the province could lose the big margin of increased dairy production it recorded in the first six months of this year.

This was suggested yesterday by E.W. Adams, provincial dairy superintendent, who noted a steady drop in butter production.

Milk production from January through June this year was up by 8,000,000 pounds, but production has been dropping steadily since mid-July, and it is still dropping despite recent rainfall which might have been expected to improve the situation.

Thus far this month 2.43 inches of rain have been recorded, which is slightly better than August a year ago, though it is still well below the long-term average of 3.37 inches.

The drought in this province goes back far beyond mid-July, but reserve moisture in the ground apparently maintained pasture growth sufficiently prior to mid-July to keep up the milk production in this province. The first drop in production was

seen in the week ending July 17, Mr. Adams said.

The butter production, January through June, was up 14 per cent over that of a year ago, and cheese production was up 43 per cent, but both are declining steadily now.

The trend is the same in Canada this year. Butter production to date down three per cent in the nation, and the butter stocks have decreased by 38 million pounds. But the latter is not serious; the butter hold-over is large.

The August rainfall of 2.43 inches here, incidentally is short of the long-term average for August which is 3.37 inches, but it is slightly better than the August, 1964 production of 2.42 inches.

It is now almost 23 years since this province was soaked completely with 6.45 inches in a 24-hour period and that was on September 22, 1942.

In case anyone remembers that soaking it was really something. A one-inch rainfall is so unusual that we haven't had one this year. The heaviest rainfall recorded in 1965 was the .75 inches which fell on August 9.

WELFARE RECIPIENTS SHOULD TRAIN

TORONTO (CP)—Mayor Leo Del Villano of Timmins said here all able-bodied welfare recipients should be forced to train for jobs.

But his suggestion got no support from a panel discussing education and training for the unemployed at the annual convention of the Ontario Municipal Association.

Mr. Del Villano, who once made welfare recipients in Timmins shovel snow, said: "All able-bodied people on welfare should be forced to take training. We should be more militant about this thing."
