OFFICIAL PLAN OF THE NEW HILLSBORO BRIDGE

In the engineer's drawing of the new Hillsboro Bridge shown above, it will be noted that the approaches start off on a tangent from either end so that at the greatest distance the roadway will be 272 feet from the existing structure. The new bridge superstructure will be 800 feet long and as indicated in the drawing will be much nearer the Southport than the Charlottetown side. Besides the two end abutments it will rest on four piers. It is estimated that about three million tons of rock fill be required for the approaches. Island sandstone will be used for the fill and will be obtained at two nearby pits at Norwood Road and Kinlock. It is expected that it will take two years to place the fill for the bridge. The bridge which is part of the Trans-Canada Highway will have a curb to curb width of 24 feet with five foot sidewalks on either side. There will be no interruption of traffic during the construction of the bridge. The overall length from the end of one approach to the other is approximately 4,600 feet.

15 New Members Inducted At Local Kinsmen Club Meeting

"There are no weaknesses in your club," the District Governor said, as he complimented the president, J.B. Shelton, and the members on having scored one hundred points in the official rating at National headquarters for the year.
