

# Row Is Touched Off Over Title For Prince Charles

 LONDON (CP)—A distinguished British solicitor has set off a seven-year-old Prince Charles should adopt when he eventually succeeds his mother to the throne.

The controversy is being fought out by indignant letters to editors of London newspapers. It has rivalled in interest the Suez canal dispute, the nation's economic crisis and the country's rain-ravaged harvest.

Isaac Foot, a member of the Privy Council and president of the Cromwell Association, touched off the controversy Sept. 3 by suggesting the Duke of Cornwall should be styled King Oliver II when he becomes king.

"We do not want Charles III," said Foot, a former lord mayor of Plymouth and United Kingdom secretary of mines in the 1930s. "Perhaps I might suggest Oliver II as being more preferable."

Foot has made an intensive study of the Puritan protector who ruled England in the 17th century after his Roundheads had beheaded Charles I. He is the author of a book entitled Oliver Cromwell and Abraham Lincoln A Comparison.

W. J. Burlingame fired in a letter calling Foot's suggestion a "preposterous proposal" and other writers charged that Cromwell "slaughtered women and children," was a "murderer" and a "tyrant."

Several letters compared Cromwell with Hitler, Stalin and President Roosevelt of Egypt, but Rev. Arthur Morley joined the battle to say "it is not fair to call Cromwell a murderer like Hitler and Stalin."

Herbert Morrison, former Labor foreign secretary, wrote saying "Whatever part Cromwell may have played in the history of this country he is certainly not re-

membered as King Oliver."

Morrison added that the only "King Oliver" he could recall was the late Joe (King) Oliver, a jazz cornet player from New Orleans.

To date none of the disputants has noted that Prince Charles' full list of Christian names is Charles Philip Arthur George, which gives a wide choice. Nor have they mentioned that Queen Elizabeth is only 30 and apparently in splendid health.

**BEGINS CONTEST-ATTACK**

A. R. Boucher of Bristol, whose royalist forefathers were bitter enemies of Cromwell, has launched a counter-attack to Foot's suggestion.

He wants the authorities to mark 1960—the tercentary of the restoration of the monarchy after Cromwell's rule—by "the removal of the statue of this regicide from the precincts of the Palace of Westminster."

The deceased, born in the province in 1887 had a distinguished career as teacher and nurse. Following her early education in St. Joseph's Convent and P.W.C. She engaged in teaching for a time, after which she trained in nursing with the Sisters of St. Joseph in St. Paul, Minn.

Later she entered the novitiate of the Sisters of the Good Shepherd at St. Paul, in 1927 she returned to Portland, Oregon, where her training as a nurse was of great value. But her greatest contribution there was to establish a four year accredited high school at St. Rose Industrial School, of which she was the principal. She received her B.A. and M.A. degrees from Portland University, and had she lived three months longer she would have been awarded her Ph.D.

Sister was a daughter of the late P.J. Berrigan and Mary Donnelly, of Dunedin, and is survived by her step-mother, Mrs. P. J. Berrigan living at Dunedin, a step brother George Cahill, retired lawyer of St. Paul, Minn., Joseph Berrigan of Allston, Massachusetts, William, James and Leo of this province and Mary, Mrs. R. A. MacIsaac, West Royalty, P.E.I., also Louis of Vancouver, B.C. A brother Ft. Lt. Leonard D.F.C. serving with the R.F. was a casualty of the last war.

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## Patrol Ship H. M. C. S. Labrador Has New First To Her Credit

OTTAWA (CP)—The navy's big northern patrol ship, HMCS Labrador, first naval vessel to navigate the Northwest Passage, has another first to her credit.

The navy announced Wednesday that she has become the first ship to make an east-to-west passage of Fury and Hecla Strait, between Baffin Island and Melville Peninsula, 250 miles inside the Arctic Circle.

The Labrador, taking part in seaborne supply for the DEW (Distant Early Warning) radar line, left Foxe Basin last week with the U.S. icebreaker Edisto to carry out a survey of Fury and Hecla Strait, the Gulf of Boothia, Prince Regent Inlet and Bell Strait.

She squeezed through the strait's narrowest section Sunday and completed her passage Monday.

day. A hastily prepared scroll commemorating the event was presented by the ship's company to the Labrador's skipper, Capt. T. C. Pullen of Oakville, Ont., and Halifax.

Labrador, which two years ago became the first ship to circumnavigate North America by passing through the Northwest Passage and the Panama Canal, left Halifax in July for her annual northern patrol. She is due back there in mid-October.
