MONTREAL (CP) - Two Montreal women writers, one French-speaking and one English-speaking, have come to the fore in a moving, feminine manner with the French fact in Quebec in a book called *Dear Enemies*, published here Wednesday - in both languages.

The book is a dialogue in letter form between journalists Solange Chaput-Rolland and now Quebec author Gwendolyn Graham, arising from their meeting on a peace train of women to Ottawa last year ago.

Contrary to the title, the two women became good friends instantly. But in their letters they let off plenty of steam, generated by the ever-present frustrations experienced by "two solitudes" in Quebec.

Solange Chaput - Rolland, a member of the national executive of Voice of Women, said she was "upset, furious and ready to snap at any English Canadian" because the Ottawa interview was carried on in English and the majority of women in the peace mission were French-speaking.

"Then Marion Scott (the wife of Frank Scott, poet and dean of law at McGill University) introduced me to Gwen. She spoke to me in French and I sensed at once her great understanding of the French fact in Quebec."

DREAMED OF BOOK "I have dreamed of writing my ideas down in such a book," said Mrs. Chaput - Rolland. "When I met Gwen I knew I would be my collaborator."

She telephoned Miss Graham three weeks after the trip on the peace train and suggested a luncheon meeting. "As soon

as I told Gwen of the plan, she agreed to it."

Gwen Graham said she had decided to abandon a novel she had begun in order to carry out the plan. Miss Graham is well known for her novel *Earth and High Heaven*, published during the Second World War, about the problem of intermarriage between Jewish and English-Canadian in Montreal.

Both authors agreed that they didn't want to write a "politic" book.

"I wanted to be frank," she said. "Both of us felt it was better to go overboard instantly. But in their letters they let off plenty of steam, generated by the ever-present frustrations experienced by "two solitudes" in Quebec."

They expect many people to disagree with them - some violently. But they hope it makes people think.

Both admit that parts of their own experiences, feelings and ideas rather than on research.

Looking back, Mrs. Chaput-Rolland feels that in reading Graham's letters she "learned more about English Canada than I learned from all the history books I ever read."

The letters started in December, 1962, and ended last August. Among the points raised by Miss Graham that impressed Mrs. Chaput-Rolland were the

lack of patience shown by many French-speaking Canadians when English-Canadians tried to speak French, and the necessity of French-Canadians to provide teachers of French for English Canada to provide a truly bilingual nation.

LEARN'S PROBLEMS Miss Graham found from Mrs. Rolland - Chaput's letters "the depth of the obstacles French-Canadian are up against when forced to speak a language that is not their own in the province of Quebec - and outside the province, where Solange described an incident when she was asked to "speak white."

Both authors were against separatism, but Solange said a united Canada would only be possible "if some changes are made."

Solange Chaput-Rolland is a radio and television broadcaster, educated in Montreal and Paris. Gwendolyn Graham was brought up in Toronto and educated in Switzerland and the United States.
