5. FRIDAY: This is FRISCO TUNA BAKE and I know you'll enjoy it.
 1/2 lb. of medium noodles (about 8 cups).
 1 minced medium onion.
 2 tbs. butter.
 1 No. 2 can tomatoes.
 1/4 tsp. garlic salt and 1 tsp. ordinary salt.
 1/4 tsp. pepper and 1/4 cup snipped parsley.
 1 can tuna (1 cup).
 1/2 lb. sharp cheese.

About one hour before dinner heat the oven to 350° F. Cook noodles as package directs. Drain, add onion, drain, add butter. Combine tomatoes, salt, pepper and parsley. In 8" x 8" x 2" baking dish place half the noodles, half of tuna, half of cheese, pour on half of tomato mixture. Repeat. Bake uncovered 40 minutes. Makes 4 servings.

6. SATURDAY: We celebrated our Silver Wedding Anniversary on the mainland during the past week and at one of the homes we visited this pie was served. Was it ever a recipe to snitch, and snitch I did! Now I'm passing it along to you, and I hope you'll enjoy it every bit as well as we did.

PEACH PIE
 One 6-oz. can undiluted canned milk (about 2-3 cup).
 1 1/2 cups fine graham cracker crumbs.
 1-3 cup melted butter.
 1 No. 2 1/2 can peach slices.
 1 1/4 tps. plain gelatin.
 One 3-oz. package cream cheese.
 1/2 cup granulated sugar.
 2 tbs. lemon juice.
 Chill milk until ice cold. Blend crumbs and butter and pack firmly in bottom and on sides of a nine inch pie pan. Chill. Drain peaches saving syrup. Set aside a few slices for the top and dice remainder. Soften gelatin in 1/4 cup peach syrup. Turn melt over hot water. Remove from heat and blend in softened cheese and sugar. Whip chilled milk in a chilled bowl until light and fluffy. Add lemon juice and whip until stiff. Beat in cream mixture 1/4 at a time. Fold in diced drained peaches. Turn into chilled crust and top with peach slices. Chill 3 hrs. or longer.

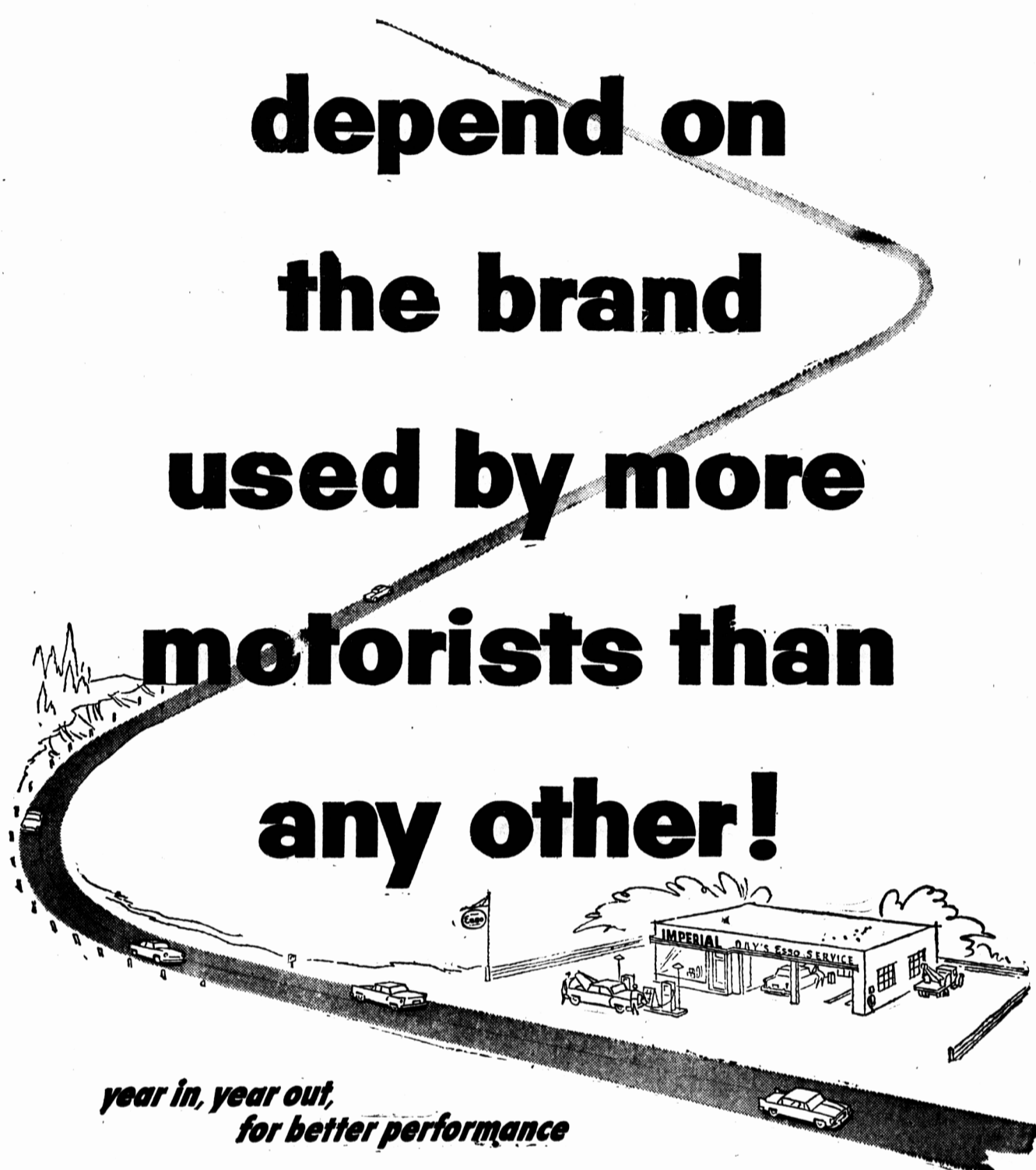
