Improvements In C. N. Telegraph Equipment Made

Alterations to equipment which will enable the commercial office of the Canadian National Telegraph in Charlottetown to speed up communications between Prince Edward Island and the mainland are under way, it was reported here yesterday by H. A. Marquis, Moncton, Maritime Superintendent for the company. The alterations to the plant have been planned in such a way that on completion the general appearance of the office will be considerably improved.

The changes have been made necessary by the increased use of the teletype by business firms not only in P.E.I. but throughout Canada, and will consist mainly of increasing by over one hundred per cent the number of carrier relay channels available. Up to the present there have been seven channels, but when the new equipment is put into use, this number will be increased to fifteen.

The new equipment will be placed in the same position as the old with the exception of the operators positions. At present these are arranged in a line along one wall, and under the new arrangement they will be grouped in a central location, avoiding the frequent changing of position made necessary by the present set-up.

Importance Of Public Speaking Is Stressed

The importance of public speaking to young businessmen was stressed by Ralph Dumont, Chairman of the Self-Development Committee, at the dinner meeting of the Charlottetown Junior Chamber of Commerce last night.

Every man sooner or later is placed in the embarrassing position whereby he is called upon to deliver a speech or to address a gathering. Mr. Dumont said, and many fail to really express themselves adequately. He stated that future achievements and promotion often hinge on how well the employee expresses his ideas before a business meeting or employer.

The Self-Development programme will continue throughout the winter months with the aim of producing many well developed speakers in the community. The foundation of a Minstrel Show to be produced within the Chamber was announced by the chairman of the show, Ed Pineau, and the committee hopes for eighteen members to make up the cast.

The Chairman of the meeting, President Fred Pound, announced that the Ways and Means Committee conducted a successful dance on Thanksgiving Day. The remainder of the meeting consisted of the showing of films and discussion of future projects and meetings.

Hopeful Regarding Potato Marketing

Optimism concerning the market possibilities this year was expressed by D. A. MacDonald, Manager of the P. E. I. Potato Marketing Board yesterday. He said that the report of the lower estimated production in the United States and the estimated drop in Canadian production is very encouraging so far as the influence on marketing is concerned.

The total estimated yield in Canada for this year is now placed far below the estimated annual Canadian consumption of eighty million bushels. Mr. MacDonald stated, and due to blight and other factors affecting the marketable portion of the crop, the percentage of this portion to the total yield will not be as great as last year.

Meeting Of Maritime Chartered Accountants

A welcome to chartered accountants of the Maritimes was extended yesterday afternoon by Mr. T. Earle Hickey, president of the Institute of Chartered Accountants of Prince Edward Island at the 1951 conference of Maritime Chartered Accountants which opened at The Charlottetown.

Mr. Peter A. Lawrence was chairman of the opening afternoon session which followed the registration period under the sponsorship of Mrs. Erma P. MacPherson. The afternoon speakers were Mr. Brenick M. Sears who discussed developments at the National conference held in Banff this past summer, and Mr. Randolph W. Manning, who spoke on "The Application of Commercial Practices in Determining Taxable Income."

Two other speakers were heard at an evening session last night with Mr. A. Emile Beauvais, president of the Canadian Institute of Chartered Accountants, discussing technical matters of general interest to the profession, and Mr. Gerald El Martin, Regional Representative on the Dominion Executive, telling of the work of the committee on Accounting and Auditing Research.

Today's Agenda — There will be a morning session today under the chairmanship of Mr. J. Wellington Dixon with Mr. D. R. Poock, Director of Finance and Service Section, Corporation Assessment Branch, Income Tax Division, as the main speaker. His talk will be concerned with development of the capital cost allowances regulations.

Appeals Adjudged In Supreme Court

The appeal of Mr. Justice George J. Tweedy from a conviction of a conviction on a charge of driving to the common danger was adjudged in Supreme Court yesterday to December 19.

Mr. N. W. Lowther, K.C., Charlottetown barrister, made application for special leave to appeal to the Supreme Court of Canada from a decision of the Supreme Court of this Province upholding a decision of the Law Society barring him from practice for a period of one year.

The appeal was heard by the Supreme Court en banc and was adjourned till Friday, October 26, at 11 a.m. for judgment. Appearing for the appellant were Mr. W. E. Bentley, K.C., and Mr. D. I. Mathieson, K.C., while Mr. J. O. C. Campbell represented the Crown and the Law Society.

Scientists Have Private Audience With Prince Philip

OTTAWA, Oct. 11 (CP) — A group of 10 Canadian scientists went to Government House today for a private audience with the Duke of Edinburgh. They discussed scientific progress in this country including atomic projects.

A Government House spokesman said the Duke, himself a fellow of the Royal Society of London and president of the British Association for the Advancement of Science, had requested the audience. Invitations were sent to the Royal Society of Canada and the National Research Council.

The National Research Council group of three scientists was headed by Dr. C. J. Mackenzie, president of the council, and included Dr. D. A. Keys, head of Canada's atomic energy development at Chalk River, Ont. The other N.R.C. man was Dr. E. W. R. Steacie, a council vice-president.

Those attending as representatives of the Royal Society of Canada included Dr. G. B. Reed of Queen's University, a vice-president of the society; Dr. W. H. Cook, honorary secretary; Dr. L. W. Lowlett, honorary treasurer; Dr. O. M. Solandt, chairman of the Defence Research Board; Dr. K. W. Neatby of the Department of Agriculture; G. S. Hume, a geological scientist; and Dr. G. Herzberg, president of the physics section in the Royal Society.

Fine Record Is Scored By Island Jersey

One of the highest Jersey records made in Eastern Canada in some time has been completed by the cow Philstead Sal here in 173811. Sal was bred by Harold Stead of Charlottetown, P. E. I., and she is owned and was tested by Edwin Lord of Bedouque.

Sal went on test as a junior four-year-old and in 365 days produced 14,903 lbs. of milk and 773 lbs. of fat on twice-a-day milking with an average test of 5.19 per cent.

Not only is Sal a great producer but she is a wonderful individual as well, classifying Very Good. She is a daughter of Pansy's White Aim—105168—an outstanding Jersey sire used artificially for a few years at Charlottetown and is now owned by the Fredrickson Artificial Breeding Unit at Fredericton, N. B.

This is the second daughter of Pansy's White Aim to produce over 14,000 lbs. of milk. The other one is the grand champion cow, Maid's Pansy.

Pansy's White Aim now has 11 classified daughters that average 83.94 per cent and his nine tested daughters average 9,453 lbs. of milk, 481 lbs. of fat with a test of 5.12 per cent. There is no doubt that this sire, if enough of his daughters were tested and classified, would easily rate a Superior Sire, announces the Canadian Jersey Cattle Club.
