## Vancouver Mink Fur Sale Total Almost Two Million

VANCOUVER (CP) — "Up, up," shouted the auctioneer's spotters. And up went the bids to a total of nearly \$2,000,000 in the first of two Vancouver mink sales this season. The sale was the richest ever held here and one of the biggest in western Canada.

Western Canada Raw Fur Auction Sales Ltd. offered about 70,000 pelts raised on British Columbia ranches to buyers from Paris, New York, Los Angeles, Seattle and Montreal. About 90 per cent were sold.

Top price was \$70 a skin for a lot of leucitia mutation skins owned by L. Freckleton of Haney, B. C. Highest price ever paid in Canada for standard dark pelts was the \$44.50 a skin.

A cerulean fur, formerly known as sapphire, brought \$61. Theo Pappas, president of the auction firm, said Wednesday the second sale will be held Dec. 22. "It will be the largest offering ever made in Canada," he added.

**QUIET AUCTIONS**  
Some 80,000 pelts are to be offered at an average value of about \$2,500,000. The sales are conducted in a calm unknown to most other types of auctions.
