

Corpus Christi.

To-day being the Feast of Corpus Christi was duly observed by the Roman Catholics of this city.

At half-past seven o'clock this morning Rev. Patrick A. McElmeel was ordained Deacon, in St. Dunstan's Cathedral, by His Lordship Bishop McIntyre. At High Mass on Sunday next the same rev. gentleman will be ordained Priest.

At eight o'clock, about ninety little boys and girls received their first communion. Rev. F. X. Gallant gave the preparatory and Rev. J. C. McLean the after instructions. Rev. F. X. Gallant said the Mass of Thanksgiving. All the communicants were pledged to abstain from intoxicating liquors until they are twenty-one years of age.

High Mass was celebrated in the Cathedral at ten o'clock, by Rev. Charles Macdonald, Rev. P. A. McElmeel and J. C. McLean officiating as Deacon and sub-Deacon, respectively. The Blessed Sacrament was exposed before Mass and remained so during the service. After Mass there was Procession and Benediction of the Blessed Sacrament.

At three o'clock this afternoon the Sacrament of Confirmation was administered to one hundred persons by His Lordship Bishop McIntyre. Hon. Senator Howland and Mrs. Howland acted as Sponsors—the former for the males and the latter for the females. There will be Vespers and Benediction of the Blessed Sacrament this evening.

Miss Ada Howard was awarded a prize for elocution and Miss Muttart, of Cape Traverse, is first in the class in analysis. Master Raymond Archibald, son of the Preceptor of the Ladies College, gained the Mathematical Scholarship in the Male Academy. Professor Burwash, received the degree of Doctor of Science. The essays of Misses Hertz, Bigney and Dickie were well written and were very attentively listened to. The selections by Misses Ayers, Comben, and the duet by the Misses Shenton were well given. Miss Churchill's violin solo was, however, the gem of the programme. The singing class were obliged to repeat their selection, "Forth to the Meadows," and it was admirably sung.

The Valedictory by Miss Marshall drew forth round after round of applause from the audience. On behalf of the graduating class she paid a high compliment to the principal, and spoke in the highest terms of the preceptors, Mrs. Archibald, and her assistants. Already her list of graduates contained the names of a number of the fairer sex. She hoped all of the graduating class would live in such a way that when they passed away it would be said of them that they have done what they could.

TELEGRAPHIC NEWS.

SPECIAL DISPATCHES TO THE EXAMINER.

Accident to a Steamer.

HALIFAX, May 30.

The Allan steamer Sardinian, Captain Ritchie, with English mails and 1,000 passengers from Liverpool, May 17th, for Montreal, was towed in here to-day with propeller off, by steamer Norseman from Liverpool for Boston with 450 passengers. All went well with the Sardinian until the morning of the 24th, when the propeller, with all attachments, suddenly snapped off. The engines ran wild for some time, but were got under control without further damage. The Sardinian proceeded under sail, and on the morning of the 24th the Elbe, for New York, was in sight, and letters and despatches were forwarded by her. That evening the Norseman hove in sight, took the Sardinian in tow and headed for Halifax, then a distance 750 miles, arriving in four days. No agreement was made for tonnage, and that will be settled by the courts. The Sardinian's passengers and mails were forwarded by special train to-night.

Inland Revenue Regulation.

OTTAWA, May 30.

A circular has been issued by the Inland Revenue Department calling attention to the fact that methylated spirits will hereafter be manufactured under the supervision of the Department here, and will be sold to varnish makers and other business at cost prices. There are 7 or 8 manufacturers of this article who will be compelled to discontinue its manufacture. This regulation has been rendered necessary from the abuses which have hitherto prevailed by which methylated spirits have been sold to druggists and used extensively in place of alcohol, and also been used extensively in the preparation of beverages.

A By-Law to Amend the By-Law Relating to Drunkenness.

(Passed 21st May, 1888.)

BE IT ENACTED BY THE City Council of the City of Charlottetown as follows:—

Section Five of the By-Law of the said City, Chapter Nine, intitled "A By-Law Relating to Drunkenness," is hereby amended by striking out the word "Thirty" in the seventh line thereof and inserting in lieu thereof the word "Ninety," and by striking out the words "Thirty Days" in the last line thereof but one and inserting in lieu thereof the words "Ninety Days, with or without hard labor."

A By-Law Relating to Pigs and Slaughter Houses.

(Passed 21st May, 1888.)

BE IT ENACTED BY THE City Council of the City of Charlottetown as follows:—

1. From and after the first day of June, in the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred and eighty-eight, until the first day of October, in the said year, no Pig or Swine shall be kept within the limits of the City of Charlottetown; and in every succeeding year no Pigs or Swine shall be kept within the limits of the said City from the first day of May until the first day of October in each year.

Provided always that Pigs or Swine may be brought into the said City for the purpose of public exhibition, or for transit, shipment or sale, if they are not kept therein longer than five days.

2. For every Pig kept in the said City in violation of the foregoing section the owner or keeper thereof shall forfeit and pay a sum not exceeding Five Dollars for the first offence, and a further sum not exceeding Five Dollars for every subsequent offence.

3. From and after the first day of January, in the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred and eighty-nine, no erection, building or place within the City of Charlottetown shall be used as a Slaughter House, or for the purpose of slaughtering animals therein.

Provided that the Board of Health may, if they see fit, grant a license to any person or persons to slaughter cattle within the limits of the said City, between the first day of December and the first day of April in each year, upon such terms and conditions and subject to such restrictions and regulations as may be imposed by the said Board of Health.

Any person or persons establishing, conducting or continuing any Slaughter House, or using any place for slaughtering animals within the said City, after the foregoing date, shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding Ten Dollars for every day he or they shall continue such nuisance, or use any such place in violation of the preceding section.

4. It shall be the duty of the Police Officers of the said City, and they are hereby required to enforce observance of the provisions of this By-Law; and a penalty not exceeding Ten Dollars may be levied by the said Magistrate or Court of Sessions on any person or persons who offend against or offend against the provisions of this By-Law.
