SHOULD RECOGNIZE GOD'S BLESSINGS

Each Christian virtue has a splen-
dor of its own, out one of the most
beautiful of all is the virtue of
gratitude. It is through it that we
express our appreciation or thanks
for favors received. In a way it is a
virtue, because it is gener-
ally taken not for granted. We
consider that people should possess
it. However, it has a value of its
own. It lends beauty and charm
to life. It spreads much happiness,
and it can dissolve much of the
sorrow present in the world.

It is to God especially that we
should be grateful. If we stop
and analyze our lives for a mo-
ment, we shall realize how many
blessings He has bestowed upon
us. He ultimately is the cause
of our very existence. Health and
beauty, the abilities that we possess,
a good home, the gift of living in a
country where peace and freedom
reign, are only a few of the multi-
tude of precious benefits that have
been showered upon us. Spiritual
gifts are infinitely superior to
these. It is not possible to buy
the gift of faith. There are many
people who would sacrifice all to
be able to have faith like ours,
and God has withheld it from
them. But He has given it to us.

In the Gospel of St. Luke we
read about the incident when Our
Lord cured the 10 lepers. We are
told that Christ was walking toward
Jerusalem. As He was passing
through the district of Galilee, 10
men who were lepers met Him.
They dared not approach close to
Our Lord because of their loath-
some disease. Instead, they stood
at a distance and called out, "Jesus,
Master, have mercy on us."
Christ turned to them and said,
"Go, show yourselves to the
priests." The lepers set out on
their way, and as they went,
their leprosy gradually went
away and their flesh was clean
and healthy. This was another
of Our Lord's wonderful miracles.
What amazes us at this point is
that of the 10 men who were heal-
ed only one returned to thank His

Benefactor.
MUST GIVE THANKS
We can learn much from this
Gospel account. We cannot help
but admire the one leper who
after his cure was grateful
enough to retrace his steps and
pay homage to Christ. How must
Our Lord have felt, it must have
filled Him with joy to see at least
one of the 10 was thankful. The
other nine fill us with disgust for
their indifference and lack of ap-
preciation.

A large proportion of the prayers
that we make to God are requests
for favors which we desire very
much. This is not improper or un-
fitting. The word "prayer" means
a petitioning or asking. God desires

that we ask for things, whether
they be material or spiritual goods.
It often happens that God wishes
to give us something, but He will
withhold it until we do ask Him
for it.

However, when He does grant
our request, we must not forget
to say "thank you." Trouble and
sorrow or any kind of grave suf-
fering naturally causes us to turn
to Our Father in heaven for re-
lief. Then when our suffering is
over, and things are going well
again, we often forget that God
ever helped us. It is only common
courtesy to thank a fellow human
being for a favor. How much
more are we obliged to acknow-
ledge the goodness of God!

NEED OTHERS' AID

In addition, we are social crea-
tures. We live in society with
others. In daily life there are
many occasions when we will
help and be helped by others.
Nobody can possibly satisfy all
his needs by himself. This means
that often we will be obliged to

show our appreciation to others
for small favors that they do for
us.

It often seems that there is
not enough happiness in the
world. Too few people seem to
possess true joy of heart. Never-
theless, we can do something about
it.

This we can bring much sunshine
everyday into the lives of others
with whom we live, by manifesting
the spirit of gratitude. Gratitude
costs nothing but a little effort,
and yet, how rewarding it is if,
through it, we can enkindle the fire
of love in somebody else's heart.
