The Lives of Public Persons.

Those who suppose that the position of
public men, especially those charged with
administering the Government of a coun-
try, is one of ease and splendor will per-
haps see reason for changing their minds
when they peruse the following statements,
taken from special Cleveland correspond-
ence of the Boston Traveller:
The dead President is at rest, and the
bereaved widow has gone back to Mentor,
the home that shall no longer know the
broad-minded, liberal-hearted Garfield,
there to think over the wonderful vicis-
situdes of the last fifteen months' life of the
man who proved himself so kind a hus-
band and so loving a father. To her it
must seem all a dream. First came the
nomination, then the canvass and the elec-
tion, followed by the inauguration, and
finally the assassination, and the heroic suffer-
ing and death. In a few days she will be
left comparatively alone, and then comes,
what some of the friends most fear, the
reaction from the fearful strain of the past
three months. Said an intimate friend of
the late President this morning:—"Mrs.
Garfield has not known an hour's quiet rest
since the nomination of her husband at
Chicago last June. For several weeks
during the campaign last year the house
at Mentor was literally overrun with
political tramps who came demanding
audience with the General, and he
did not have the nerve not to
say the heart, to turn them from his door,
and the result was that Mrs. Garfield and
'Mother' Garfield had to look after feeding
from forty to sixty of these people every
day. It is within my knowledge that many
times during that campaign the children
had to sleep in the barn in order that ac-
commodation might be provided for certain
politicians who came to Mentor and forced
their company on the household over-
night. At this time General Garfield felt
he could not offend those who came to
see him and who had a certain amount
of influence in their respective localities,
and the result was they stayed, and the
children had to leave the house and sleep
in the barn. I tell you the world does not
know, or never will know, what Mrs. Gar-
field has had to endure since the Chicago
Convention. Now she goes back to her old
home to get peace, but at what a terrible
sacrifice! In the loneliness of that home
she will long for the dear past, before
the Nation sought out her husband and
elevated him only that he might be laid
low in the grave."

NEWS NOTES.

At Hamilton active steps are being taken
to provide for the city's future needs in the
way of parks.
It is estimated that between 5,000 and
9,000 men will be employed in the shanties
this winter on the Upper Ottawa.
One hundred acres of Vancouver Island
coal lands, which a year ago could not be
sold for \$1,000, was sold on Tuesday for
\$30,000.
It is another illustration of the new in-
terest England is taking in American
affairs that a biography of President Gar-
field is to be published in London, with
the title, "From the Log Cabin to the
White House."
At the Geographical Congress in Venice
several Canadians were honored by special
mention. In class 8 honorable mention
was made of Monsieur D. Maurice, of
Quebec Province, and in class 6 a diploma
of honor was conferred on the Lieutenant
Governor of Quebec. A paper on the
adoption of a prime meridian, by Mr.
Fleming was well received and the scheme
proposed was adopted. A committee of 13
gentlemen being appointed to elaborate it.
Of those included are Dr. Daniel Wilson
and Mr. John Lamont of Toronto, and Mr.
Sandford Fleming of Ottawa.
The settlers on the French shore of New-
foundland are becoming as notorious for
their fractious conduct as the Afghans.
The island belongs to Great Britain, and
the people acknowledge the Colonial author-
ity, but since the Treaty of Utrecht the
French settlers have used a certain part
of the coast to cure their fish. Sometimes
the British subject thinks the Frenchman
an intruder, and again it occurs to the
Frenchman that because he has concurrent
rights in a certain district that he must
well have exclusive rights. This is what
led to the late conflict on the French shore,
and to make things quiet H. M. S. *Druid*
has left St. John's, N. F., for the scene of
the row.
A St. Petersburg despatch of the 23rd
September says:—"For some days past there
has been considerable excitement here, in-
dicating that we are on the eve of great
events. Large numbers of students have
arrived. The police are more active than
ever. Proclamations are issued by secret
printing establishments and profusely cir-
culated. Houses are searched at all hours
of the day and night. The Emperor's body
guard has again been increased. On Satur-
day the Minister to the Imperial household
and the officer specially entrusted with the
charge of the Czar's person held a confer-
ence of several hours. All this may be
connected with the approaching interview
of the Czar with the Emperor of Austria.
Everyone is suspected here. A ukase pre-
scribing additional measures of caution will
be issued shortly."
