**Living Costs In 10 Cities Show Slight Increase**

OTTAWA (CP)—Living costs rose slightly during March in seven of 10 regional cities, including Toronto, Ottawa and Halifax.

Costs in two others—Montreal and Vancouver—were unchanged, while Winnipeg was the only city to show a decline, the bureau of statistics reported Monday.

Most of the increases sprang from higher food prices, although rents were higher in four cities and medical and dental fees higher in five cities.

The consumer price index, based on 1949 prices equalling 100, March 1 with April 1 figures in brackets:

Toronto 118.7 (118.2); Montreal 116.7 (116.7); Ottawa 117.7 (117.3); Winnipeg 116.5 (116.8); Vancouver 118.6 (118.6); Saint John, N. B., 117.6 (117.4); Halifax 114.8 (114.3); St. John's, Nfld. 105.9 (105).
