

Eastern Canada Tennis Championships Conclude

QUEBEC, July 13 (CP)—Harold Burrows, Charlottetown, Va. tennis ace, walked off with three titles in the Eastern Canada tennis championships and Mrs. Hanna Sladek, the Czech native now playing out of Montreal, won two.

Top-seeded Burrows won the singles crown today over Lorne Main, Vancouver and Montreal, 6-4, 1-6, 6-2, 7-5.

Last night, he teamed with Mrs. Sladek, top-seeded in the women's division, to defeat Toronto's Mrs. Louise Brown and Don Platt in mixed doubles 6-3, 6-1.

Today, in men's doubles, he paired with veteran Canadian Davis Cup player, Henri Rochon of Montreal to walk over Robert Bedard, Sherbrooke, Que., and Jack Spencer, Montreal, 6-0, 6-0, 6-0.

Rhonda Mrs. Sladek won her singles championship from Mrs. Brown 6-2, 6-2.

Displaying the form that has won her the Ontario and Quebec provincial singles titles earlier this summer, Mrs. Sladek lost her service only once in the two sets.

Mrs. Brown avenged her singles defeat by teaming with fellow-Torontonian Dorothy Hurst to win the women's doubles title over Mrs. Sladek and Ruth Porter, Montreal, 6-6, 2-6, 6-0.

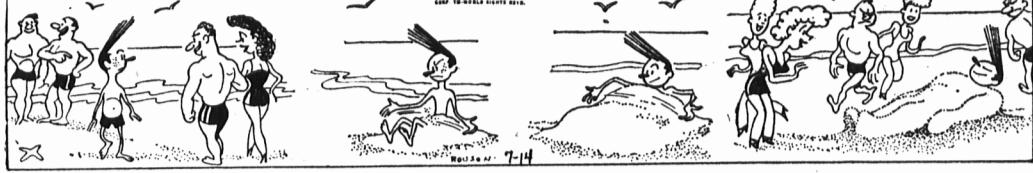

Victories By Miss Knox Highlight Racing Under Lights At Local Track

A well conditioned Miss Knox driven by veteran reinsman Len O'Meara won two heats of the 2.18 Conditioned Pace with spectacular drives to highlight Saturday night's racing meet at the Charlottetown Driving Park before the season's largest crowd of spectators.

O'Meara drove Miss Knox to win in the second and fifth dashes and in the latter the sleek bay mare paced the mile in 2:09 3-5, the fastest time of the night. The third dash was won by A.G. Scott in 2:11 3-5.

Dean Gallon, owned and driven by Earle Semple, came up with an outstanding trotting exhibition to win both dashes of the 2:25 Trot. Dean Gallon passed Pet Hanover in the stretch to win the first dash and in the second dash led from wire to wire.

Driver O'Meara had one of his better nights Saturday as he came home with three firsts. In addition to piloting Miss Knox home twice he drove Babe Britton to a well deserved win in the sixth race.

Dean Swift, Joandale and Calumet Onward were the other winners in the nine dash meet.

Miss Knox beat off a challenge by Prince Budlong to win the first dash of the 2.18 Pace Conditioned. O'Meara pulled Miss Knox out at the three-eighths pole and at the half had built up a lead of two lengths over the second place Josedale Clipper and third place Prince Budlong.

As they moved up the back stretch Prince Budlong passed the fading Josedale Clipper to move into second place and finish a half length behind Miss Knox.

The second heat of this event was the most thrilling of the meet. Lucky Number and Dale B. spurted into the lead at the starting gate and battled for the pole until the quarter mark when Lucky Number went to the top.

Lucky Number stayed in the lead until the half when Roach McGregor drove Josedale Clipper up on the outside and both horses staged a neck and neck battle for the lead until the five-eighths pole.

The two faded on the back stretch and O'Meara took Miss Knox up from fourth place to go into the lead at the upper turn. Miss Knox and Prince Budlong paced down the stretch with Miss Knox coming under the wire a half length in front.

A.G. Scott, who specializes in winning final dashes, led most of the way in winning the last heat. The Scott horse went into the lead near the quarter pole and stayed there to beat off a stretch challenge by Miss Knox.

At the half it was A.G. Scott, Josedale Clipper, Miss Knox and Prince Budlong in that order with A.G. Scott well out in front due to the slow pace being set by the second place horse. As they moved up the back stretch onto the turn Miss Knox finally got clear of the trap but A.G. Scott had too great a lead for the Knox mare to overcome.

Dean Swift won the first dash of the night by mosing out Belle Budlong with a stretch drive. Belle Budlong went to the top at the quarter mark and stayed in front until Teddy Weir came up from second place with Dean Swift to win in the stretch.

Dean Gallon and Pet Hanover staged a two-horse race in the first dash of the 2.25 Trot. Pet Hanover went into an early lead and increased the margin to two lengths at the five-eighths pole. Then Dean Gallon with a brilliant

Canadian Scullers At Olympics Happy

HELSINKI, July 13 (CP)—Canadian scullers and oarsmen whooped it up today when they got wind of plans to fly home-country shells here in time for the summer Olympics.

They were just about at the bottom of the barrel in their efforts to find substitutes for shells that were smashed when a North Atlantic storm hit the ship bringing them here.

The team got word of the plans when members returned to Olympic village after a stiff two-hour workout on borrowed shells.

Moral hit a peak. Some members vowed they would "live" on water until the games open July 20.

(In Toronto arrangements were made to give shells for the four and eight in Helsinki. Tom Allison the rowing team's equipment manager said Friday that two boats will be flown from Montreal this week. The plane is due to arrive in Helsinki Tuesday.

Paddy Cline of Hamilton, coach of the fours, said that if it means anything, the opposition will find Canada hard to beat.
