### Gov't Deposits Show Decrease

OTTAWA (CP)—Government of Canada deposits decreased by \$7,333,000 to \$20,245,000 in the week ending Nov. 6, the Bank of Canada reported Thursday in its weekly financial statement. Chartered bank deposits decreased by \$45,693,000 to \$808,666,000 while notes in circulation increased by \$29,241,000 to \$2,212,195,000.

### ORDER COMPANIES SEIZED

JAKARTA, Indonesia (Reuters)—President Sukarno has ordered the seizure of all Malay-Asian-owned or backed rubber milling companies in East Sumatra. It was announced Wednesday. He has also instructed his people not to listen to the broadcasts of Radio Malaysia and has imposed heavy penalties for anyone caught tuning in.

## Trade Disruption Said Unthinkable

Commenting on an Ottawa dispatch quoting Transport Minister Mellicham as saying an assessment of the costal service between Pictou, Charlottetown and the Magdalen Islands will be made by the Canadian Maritime Commission, Marketing Director Reid Sangster, said, "It is unthinkable that there be any disruption or cancellation of our trade with the Magdalen Islands."

Mr. Mellicham said that the assessment is being made so that Ottawa can arrive at a decision to renew the service or consider the terms of the contract. **VOICED SURPRISE** On Oct. 23, the Ottawa Bureau of The Guardian was told by Mr. Mellicham that there is no intention of cutting off the subvention, which amounts to \$288,000 a year. He expressed surprise at rumors to this effect, and said the review to be carried out on all transportation services was a routine one designed to place the subvention system on a more business-like basis. Mr. Sangster acknowledged that the yearly review of the costal service was a normal matter, and that in view of the minister's statement concerning the subsidy, he felt the service would continue.

## Shippers Will Protest Overseas Rate Boost

By DON MacLEOD Printing out the effect a planned freight rate increase would have on this province's United Kingdom market, government sources said that with the assistance of the Maritime Transportation Commission, Island processors of frozen fresh fried potatoes will make a submission to the Canada-United Kingdom Freight Conference. The conference plans to raise freight rates by 38 per cent in mid-January on shipments to the United Kingdom from Eastern Canadian ports. Agricultural officials here fear that the extra costs will endanger the frozen french fried potato market. Commenting on the situation, Premier Walter R. ## Liquor Laws To Remain Unchanged

Premier Walter R. Shaw said yesterday, the government does not plan any change in the liquor laws, unless there are widespread recommendations from the liquor industry. In view of the fact that the recommendations don't seem to be there, the premier said "it would appear that most of our people are satisfied with the present arrangement."

Commenting on a planned move by the P.E.I. Temperance Commission to police licensed liquor outlets, Premier Shaw said "whatever outlets are provided for liquor consumption, those facilities must be maintained at a high standard of control. In drawing up new regulations, the commission is working entirely within its frame of reference."

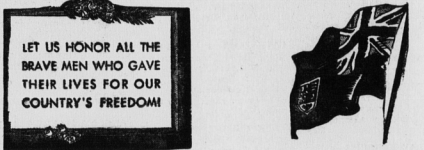
## Sugar Demand Exceeds Output Is Prediction

LONDON (AP)—The world's demand for sugar will considerably out weigh production against next year, the International Sugar Council said Thursday. In a report on Wednesday's meeting here, the council said it adopted the statistical committee's estimate of the net import requirements of the free market for 1964 amounting to 11,400,000 metric tons (about 12,600,000 short tons.) This, with the import requirements of the United States from foreign sources, estimated at 1,540,000 metric tons, made a total requirement of the world market of 14,970,000 metric tons.
