P.E.I. Veterinary Service Policy

Owing to a very limited number of veterinary practitioners in Prince Edward Island, and because of an ever increasing demand by livestock breeders of the Province for the service of veterinarians the Minister of Agriculture, Hon. C. C. Baker has deemed it necessary to formulate a Veterinary Service Policy.

The establishment of practitioners in various parts of the Province will serve the needs of the breeders in the respective areas. These men are all fully qualified to administer treatment and use preventive medicine in the control and prevention of animal diseases.

Frozen Fish Stocks

OTTAWA, May 15 — (CP) — Stocks of frozen fish in Canada totalled 25,497,000 pounds on May 1, an increase from 18,680,000 pounds on the same date last year, the Bureau of Statistics reported today.

Large Pulpwood Shipments Made; Fewer Potatoes

Large increases in pulpwood shipments and large decreases in the shipment of potatoes for April in comparison with April, 1950 are shown in figures released yesterday from the Superintendent of the Office, C.N.R., for the Island Division.

327 carloads of pulpwood were shipped out of the Province during the month in comparison with two carloads in the same month last year. 239 carloads were shipped from points east and south of Charlottetown. 91 carloads were from localities west of Summerside and 12 were from points between Charlottetown and Summerside.

Potato shipments decreased from 1,415 in April, 1950, to 985 in April of this year. 57 carloads of turnips were exported during the past month against 71 carloads in April a year ago.

Egg shipments were down to 14 carloads from 22 carloads last April. Livestock and meats, however, showed an increase with 90 carloads of livestock being exported against 83 in April, 1950, and meat shipments being 25 this year against 21 the same month a year ago.

Shipments of hay and straw were decreased from 51 carloads a year ago to nine carloads this year. 12 carloads of lumber were exported against no shipments of the same material in April, 1950.

Shipments of lime into the Province more than tripled. 158 carloads were imported during the past month compared to 46 in April, 1950. Lumber imports also increased from 29 carloads to 31 the past April.

Shipments of fruit into the Province decreased from 16 to nine Flour and feed shipments were also down from 144 in April, 1950 to 127 in April this year.

Gas and oil shipments increased from 106 to 152; cement from 23 to 40; canned goods from 17 to 30; shingles and roofing from zero to 26; and vegetables from zero to four.

The total number of carloads ferried from Borden to Cape Tormentine, 1658, was 129 below the April, 1950 figure of 1787. 1350 carloads were imported to the Province in comparison to 1208 carloads the same month a year ago.

Egg And Poultry Marketing Report

The poultry industry in the Province continues to advance with the times, Mr. F. M. Nash, District Inspector, Poultry Products, reported yesterday.

Egg and poultry prices are favourable and producers have introduced plans to take advantage of the enhanced market for their product. Orders for baby chicks have been increased, both for males and females, the males or cockerels for the production of meat birds and the females for the production of eggs for the market this fall and winter.

The production of eggs in Canada is somewhat lower than last year with the result eggs are in demand for consumptive, breaking and storage purposes. Eggs have been in such short supply that the storing of eggs has been sharply reduced and eggs have been imported from Holland and Ireland for breaking purposes.

As the result of all this, the market has advanced paying prices are now paying producers for ungraded eggs Grade A Large 54, Grade A Medium 52, Grade A Pullet 42, Grade B 42, Grade C 30, and are quoting for graded eggs delivered AL 60-60 1/2, AM 58-58 1/2, AP 48, B 49, C 35. Wholesalers are quoting retailers for this pack AL 63, AM 61, AP 51, Grade B 52, C 38. Eggs are being sold to consumers at Grade A Large 66-9, Grade A Medium 67, Grade A Pullet & B 58.

Delegation Urges New Post Office For Kensington

At the regular monthly meeting of the Kensington Town Council, held on Monday night, a delegation from the Kensington Post Office waited on the Mayor and Councillors with a request that immediate representations be made to the Federal authorities for the erection of a new post office building in Kensington.

It was pointed out that the present post office is far from adequate to handle the volume of mail and furthermore that due to lack of proper drainage and water and sewerage facilities the building is actually unsanitary.

It was further pointed out that since the amount required for the erection of the building had been passed in the estimates two years ago that the Federal representative, Mr. J. Watson MacNaught, be requested to look into the matter and act and press for immediate action.

The meeting was presided over by the Deputy Mayor W. H. Darach, and there was a full attendance of the councillors. Bills amounting to \$749.70 were read and passed.

A letter was read from the Health and Welfare Department informing the Council that there would be no health inspection in the town this year as one had been made a year ago and it was not felt that another would be warranted at this time.

It was on motion agreed that the rate for the use of the Town pumper for pumping out local cellars would be set at one dollar per hour. The Council decided to gravel those streets in the Town which have already had a foundation of clay laid.

The police report showed that during the month there had been four arrests and four convictions and that fines amounting to \$77.00 had been collected.

The meeting adjourned to meet again on Friday evening at seven o'clock when the matter of the Town assessment rate will be taken up.

Move To Broaden Chinese Arms Embargo

UNITED NATIONS, N. Y., May 15 — (AP) — France moved today to broaden the projected United Nations embargo against war materials for Communist China to include transportation materials, such as locomotives and steel rails.

French delegate Francis Lacoste lobbied in the proposal. One aim apparently is to prevent the shipment of steel rails and other supplies from West Germany to Peiping.

These supplies would be wrapped up within the embargo on arms, ammunition, war materials and supplies for making war materials which was approved yesterday by an 11 to 0 vote of a U. N. sanctions committee. Canada, a committee member, backed the move.

The Soviet bloc, headed by Deputy Foreign Minister Jacob Malik of Russia, is certain to blast the United States and United Nations policies toward Red China and the Korean war in debate in the political committee of the U. N. General Assembly, called to meet Thursday.

WASHINGTON, May 15 — (AP) — Government authorities said today there have been no peace feelers from the Chinese Communists. The high command's hope is to force the Reds to seek peace eventually by inflicting heavy losses on them, but so far the enemy has shown no slackening in its determination to throw U. N. forces out of Korea.

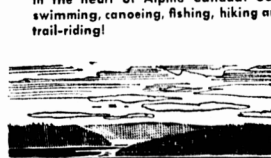
