

Proposal To Have Bishops Reconcile Church Of Scotland

EDINBURGH (Reuters)—Leaders of the Church of Scotland Tuesday agreed to consider a proposal to have a general assembly of the church to discuss the proposal to introduce bishops into the church.

The annual general assembly of the church decided that the report containing the proposal should be examined by church members. But it agreed the report by a committee of theologians was "no more than an exploratory survey."

Dr. A. C. Craig of Glasgow said he had described the report as "full of dynamite." But its authors believed it contained "theological penicillin."

The plan, he said, gives immense promise for the cause of Christian unity wherever Anglicans and Presbyterians sought reconciliation.

The Duke of Hamilton, a church district elder, said that to refuse to discuss the report would be "a tragic breach of Christian courtesy to our fellow Christians in the Anglican church."

The introduction of Anglican-style bishops is a revolutionary idea to a people whose ancestors fought and died to prevent the English imposing their Episcopalian rites on the simple, Calvinistic faith of Scotland.

The report was drawn up by representatives of the Church of Scotland and the Church of England as a means of ending age-old feuds between the two church systems.

Dances on Church Property Forbidden

OTTAWA (CP)—The apostolic delegate has reminded all Roman Catholic bishops that dances on church property are forbidden, it was learned Wednesday.

The action followed the May 3 street-fight death of Rene Jodoin, 17, outside west-end Our Lady of Perpetual Help Church after a parish youth gathering described by the pastor, Msgr. John O'Neill, as a "social evening" that included dancing.

Police charged two youths and three juveniles with manslaughter following the fight. They now are on remand.

Creamery Butter Stocks Decline

OTTAWA (CP)—Creamery butter stocks in nine Canadian cities May 16 declined to 23,228,000 pounds from 46,393,000 on the corresponding date last year, the bureau of statistics said Wednesday.

Holdings by cities with last year's figures in brackets: Quebec 1,044,000 (4,485,000); Montreal 15,654,000 (23,331,000); Toronto 929,000 (5,391,000); Winnipeg 2,551,000 (11,647,000); Calgary 390,000 (1,480,000); Vancouver 1,063,000 (5,420,000); Regina 251,000 (308,000); Saskatoon 224,000 (255,000); Edmonton 1,102,000 (246,000).

dances on church property or dances elsewhere organized by priests, are forbidden by edicts from Rome.

The ban dates back to about 1910 and was reaffirmed by Rome in the 1930s, the official said. The main reason for the ban is that organizing dances is not considered a proper work for priests whose energy should be devoted to spiritual matters, nor a proper use of church property.

The ban does not apply to dances organized by Catholic lay organizations and held outside church property.

B. of M. Credits Immigration With Prosperity

MONTREAL (CP)—Immigration, like money, has contributed to the "remarkable record" of Canada's economic expansion in the last decade, says the monthly review of the Bank of Montreal.

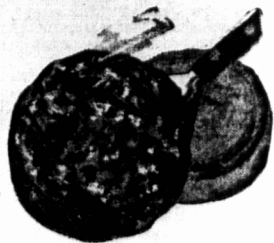
In an article devoted to immigration to Canada, the bank's monthly news letter says there can be little doubt that immigration has played an "integral part" in the recent growth of the Canadian economy.

The resulting addition to the labor force has eased a shortage of manpower that would otherwise have been acute, it says.

"And, what is perhaps of even greater significance, immigration has brought over 1,000,000 new customers—for the most part adult customers—to the Canadian market since 1949 and has thereby added materially to the domestic demand for housing and a wide range of consumer goods and services."
