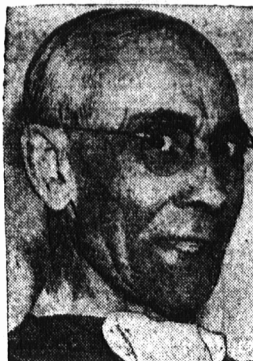

LONDON, July 22.—(Reuters)—Trade Minister Peter Thorneycroft complained of United States tariff barriers and pleaded for a fair deal for British exporters in an address today to the U. S. Chamber of Trade here. Thorneycroft said the U. S. appears to be trying to solve the problem of its gigantic surplus with the outside world "without doing more than tinker with the very trade barriers which date from the time of the great depression."

Fined On Lesser Count In Case of Rafuse Fatality

The charge of manslaughter in the death of Harry Rafuse on July 1st, against Roderick Steele and Wendall Nicholson of Cardigan was withdrawn by Mr. S. E. Hession, Crown prosecutor for King's at Georgetown yesterday afternoon.

A charge was then laid by the Montague R. C. M. P. against Roderick Steele that being the driver of an automobile, he "did unlawfully fail to stop the said automobile after an accident between the person, Harry Rafuse, and the said automobile, and drive on without giving his name and address with intent to escape civil and criminal liability contrary to section 285 (2) of the Criminal Code of Canada and amendments thereto."

The defendant pleaded guilty, and Stipendiary Magistrate Joseph W. MacDonald sentenced him to a fine of \$100 and costs.
