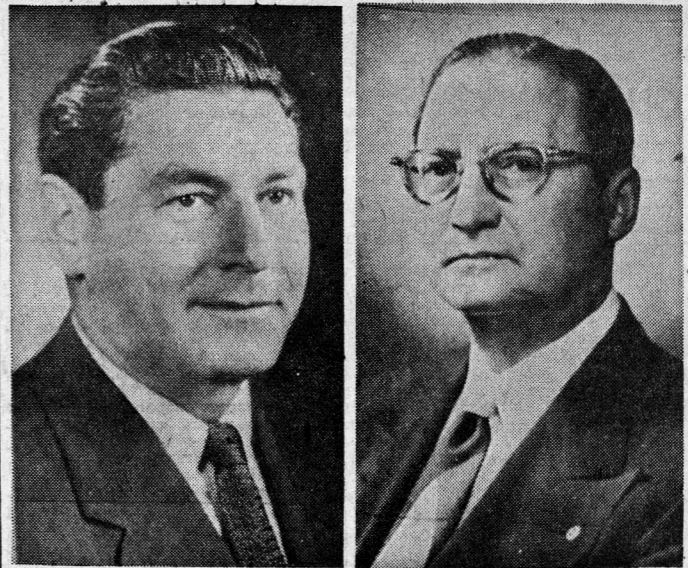
HONORED GUESTS AT AFTERNOON TEA

U. S. Fish Plant Owners Arrive

Car Out Of Control, Hits Culvert

Two young men from St. Peter's, Reginald MacKinnon, 21, and Frank Milligan of about the same age are in critical condition in the Charlottetown Hospital following an accident in which their car went out of control at St. Peter's yesterday evening about 6.15. Police report that the car owned by MacKinnon, a 54 Ford, apparently went out of control at a curve near the Railway water tank. Road markings would indicate that the machine struck a culvert and turned turtle before striking a second culvert about 70 yards distant. They were travelling in an easterly direction at the time of the accident.

Parliament At A Glance

By THE CANADIAN PRESS Wednesday, June 4, 1958. The Commons voted the government \$24,593,000 in interim money supply to cover administration in June and July. Justice Minister Fulton indicated government employees likely will be granted a chance to answer allegations against them on security grounds. Senator A. B. Baird (N.S.) criticized the deficit budget he said is in prospect, and claimed Canadians are losing their old qualities of thrift.

IODE Wants Registration Of Canadians

HALIFAX (CP)—The Imperial Order Daughter of the Empire decided Wednesday to ask the Federal Government to "institute without delay" a system of registration for all Canadian residents between 16 and 70. Canadians are becoming "more conscious of the need for preparedness in the event of a national emergency," the resolution said, and a record of the place of residence, occupation and age of individuals would be valuable in such a case.

Canada's Aid Abroad Has Passed The Four Billion Mark

OTTAWA (CP) — Canada's post-war financial assistance abroad has passed \$4,300,000,000, the external affairs department said Wednesday. More than half was in outright grants, the remainder loans which have been partly repaid. The figure of \$4,300,000,000 covers the period up to March 31, 1958, and does not include more scores of millions of dollars earmarked for foreign aid in the current fiscal year.

Dust Storms In Australia

ADELAIDE, Australia (Reuters)—The whole of South Australia State — 380,000 square miles — was covered Wednesday by a thick pall of dust reported by airline pilots to have reached a height of 6,000 feet. The massive cloud arose as winds of 50 miles an hour whipped up the topsoil from a large part of the state's farmlands, where farmers had taken advantage of an unusually warm weather to work their land.

Rebels Cool To DeGaulle Speech

TUNIS (Reuters) — The rebel Front Wednesday night described Gen. de Gaulle's speech in Algerian National Liberation fighters as "no basis whatsoever for a reconciliation." "We are all French citizens starting today, with only one legislative assembly," he said. It was a day of emotional binges. Bands played, flags waved. Medals glittered. Troops paraded and thousands sang La Marseillaise.

Planes Came From Argentina

OTTAWA (CP)—Defence Minister Pearkes indicated Wednesday in the Commons that U.S. Air Force planes that swooped low over Russian trawlers on the Grand Banks off Newfoundland came from the U.S. base at Argentina, Nfld. Opposition Leader Pearson asked whether the planes operated from U.S. bases on Canadian soil and whether Canadian planes also take part in such surveillance.

OTTAWA (CP)—The Canadian Teachers' Federation said Wednesday there are no "insuperable barriers" to greatly increased federal aid to the provinces and Canadian municipalities for elementary and secondary education.

Emergency Aid For Jobless In U. S. Planned

WASHINGTON (AP) — President Eisenhower Wednesday signed a bill providing emergency federal financing for additional jobless relief payments by the states. The states have an option whether they will go along with the plan, and there is a question of how many can or will take advantage of it.

S' Side Mayor On Executive; Want Action For More Jobs

VICTORIA (CP) — Mayor H.G.R. Mews of St. John's, Nfld., was elected president of the Canadian Federation of Mayors and Municipalities Wednesday night, succeeding Mayor Lloyd Jackson of Hamilton.

Toronto Industrialist Pleads Guilty, Sentenced For Fraud

TORONTO (CP) — William Philip LeGros, 45, who rose from a newsboy to a \$25,000-a-year industrialist within 20 years, was sentenced Wednesday to two years less a day definite and one year indeterminate for a bank fraud of \$80,250. In a surprise ending to a five-year-old case, LeGros changed his plea to guilty at an unscheduled appearance before Judge Robert Forsyth.
