NEW YORK (AP)—A scattered recovery put stock market statistics narrowly on the upside Friday after three straight days of irregular decline. The Dow Jones average advanced 3.18 to 940.68—somehow below Monday's record closing peak of 942.65.

The Associated Press average of 60 stocks advanced 1.4 to a peak of 349.0, with industrials up 1.8 to a record high, rails up 1.9 to a record high and utilities 1.3 to a record high and utilities 1.1.

Among Canadians, Aluminum Ltd. and Dome Mines each gained 1/2 while Canadian Pacific moved up 1/4 and Granby Mining advanced 1/2. Walker Gooderham advanced 1/4.

Prices were generally higher on the American Stock Exchange than on the Montreal and Canadian stock exchanges.

Day-to-day money was down and closed at 3 1/2 per cent. Amount available was \$245,000, 600 compared with \$257,000,000 available last week.

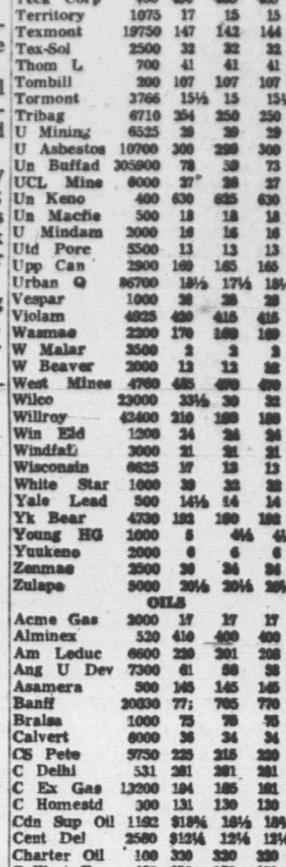
