### Arrival Of Freighter Opens Ch'town's Shipping Season

Charlottetown's shipping season opened yesterday with the arrival of the SS Magdalene at Buntain and Bell's wharf.

The 175-foot steamer, under the command of Captain J. H. Chouinard, was to load about 100 tons of cargo and leave on return to the Magdalene Islands last night.

The vessel's regular run during the season is from Pictou to the Magdalenes; Charlottetown to the Magdalenes and back to Pictou. P. E. Dumont, manager of the Magdalene Islands Transportation Company Limited, said the ship did not encounter any ice trouble on the way.

Mr. Dumont said his company expects to do an increased business this year because of improved air port facilities at the Magdalene Islands and because he expects a more bountiful catch of fish.

J. H. Cerry, Imperial Oil manager, said yesterday his company has set a tentative date of May 23rd for the arrival of the first tanker to Charlottetown. It was not known which of the company's big tankers would be the first to arrive.

William Connolly, Irving Oil Company manager in Charlottetown, said he expects to know within a few days when the first Irving Oil tanker will arrive.

**In Times of Sorrow**  
When death comes to any home, those who survive have the sad duty of informing others of the loss that has been suffered. These newspapers offer the following carefully planned services as a means of assisting in that task:

**OBITUARIES**  
Brief news reports of deaths will be published under this heading without charge, whenever necessary information is supplied without delay. In most cases it is best to have the undertaker supply the facts required to the newspapers.  
If more convenient, these reports may be supplied directly to the news department of The Guardian and The Evening Patriot, in Charlottetown, or to any of the news bureaus of the paper, in Summerside, Montague, Alberton or Souris.  
All such reports should include the full name, age, place of birth and occupation of the deceased; date of death; names and addresses of closely-related survivors and the date, time and place of funeral. Special distinctions in the career of the deceased—such as war service and offices held—also should be included.

**DEATH NOTICES**  
When traditional formal notices of death are not supplied until after the funeral has taken place, they will appear as "Death Notices," rather than under the heading of "Deaths, Funerals," but will be grouped in the same news daily department adjoining the classified advertising section.  
Many items such as have formerly appeared under an "In Memoriam" heading will in future be published as "Death Notices."  
All notices of this kind should be placed with the Classified Advertising Department in Charlottetown or at the branch offices of the newspapers.

**DEATHS, FUNERALS**  
Traditional formal notices, supplied without delay following death, will be published under this heading, in a new department which will appear daily in the columns immediately adjoining the classified advertising section.  
Ordinarily it is preferable to have such notices placed by the undertaker, or they may be placed directly with the Classified Advertising Department or the branch offices of The Guardian and The Evening Patriot.  
In any case in which notices are received too late in the day for inclusion in the new
