

## CAHA Approves Player Replacements in Jr. Finals

REGINA, (CP)—Player replacements for any three "weak sisters" on a team in the Memorial Cup finals was approved Tuesday by the Canadian Amateur Hockey Association.

But the west lost by a close vote its argument for an actual manpower advantage in the final junior championship series—a move which western delegates to the annual meetings said would improve western teams' showing in the finals. Last prairie team to win the title was Winnipeg Monarchs in 1946.

Defeated 12-10 was a Saskatchewan amendment asking special exception for western teams to a new regulation forcing player-strengthened clubs to cut their roster to 18 plus the spare goalkeeper.

The CAHA earlier this year allowed Regina Pats three extra players in their Memorial Cup finals with Toronto Marlboros, giving Regina a 21-18 player edge.

**DIDN'T USE HELP**

But Pats didn't make full use of the added help. They went through the series—which they lost—by using mostly their original lineup.

Ken More of Regina said one of the reasons Pats didn't use the extra players was that it might have damaged the morale and

hockey future of the three east-offs.

The new regulation, introduced by the Manitoba AHA, superseded another submitted through the Saskatchewan branch by the Western Canada Junior Hockey Association and asking the straight addition of three players.

**APPROVE REQUEST**

Another WCJHA request—that junior players transferred from British Columbia to other junior clubs in western Canada be freed from import rules—was approved by the association.

These two requests were believed among the western association's grievances indicated in a report to the CAHA Monday by Ken Mayhew of Yorkton, Sask., WCJHA secretary-manager.

He said "some people in the west threaten to tear themselves away from the CAHA" because of dissatisfaction with CAHA rules governing acquisition of players.

Also defeated was a motion by George Dudley, CAHA secretary-manager, to eliminate east-west alternation of Memorial and Allan cup finals and leave the title decided by the CAHA president.

Under a new regulation passed, teams now are refused the right to use a replacement goalie in the same game in which the regular goaltender is injured.

## Blue Bombers Lead MIFU In Advance Ticket Sales

Winnipeg Blue Bombers didn't win the Western Interprovincial Football Union championship last year but they lead the five-team league in advance ticket sales for the new season.

The club has sold 13,000 advance tickets to each of its eight home games in 1955. Winnipeg Stadium capacity is 19,000.

Edmonton Eskimos, Grey Cup and WIFU champions, have sold 11,300 season tickets with an objective of 12,500. Stadium capacity is nearly 20,000.

In Vancouver, the Lions enter their second year in the league assured of at least 8,800 spectators a game. The club, which finished last in 1954, is aiming for 13,000 season ticket sales. Empire Stadium can handle 25,500 spectators without supplementary bleachers or standing room.

**HALF FILLED**

Saskatchewan Roughriders have sold 7,200 tickets, filling half the stadium.

Six thousand have already bought tickets to watch Calgary Stampeders in action at home. Advance sales objective is 9,500. The stadium seats 16,700.

Vancouver is expected to top last year's budget of \$435,000 by \$100,000 and team officials estimate that if no exhibition games are played, an average attendance of

20,000 is necessary to break even. Stampeders officials estimate an average of 12,500 is needed at each game to break even for the season.

**NEED 15,000**

Roughriders officials say an attendance of 15,000 a game will be sufficient for the club to break even.

The Eskimos drew an average of 16,900 to league games last year, while their playoff games attracted an average of more than 19,000 spectators.

## Durrelle Loses In England

LONDON (AP)—Ron Barton of London Tuesday night defeated Yvon Durrelle, Canada's light heavyweight champion, when the Canadian was disqualified for striking a low blow.

The referee stopped the scheduled 10-round fight in the first 10 seconds of the third round. The boxers left the ring to a chorus of catcalls from the fans.

Barton weighed 171½ pounds; Durrelle, 171 pounds, 10 ounces.

Barton was ahead on points at the time the fight was stopped. At the start of the second round the Londoner rushed across the ring and got in a series of left and right jabs before Durrelle, of Baie Ste. Anne, N.B., got his guard up.

Durrelle then scored with several good left hooks but often was beaten to the punch by Barton's combinations.

The fight was to have been an important test for Barton, who had previously won 16 bouts without being defeated. He is considered an outstanding puncher.

Durrelle, whose nose bled from the first round on, fought from a crouching position which bothered the upright Briton and often prevented him from connecting with his best punches.

The fight was stopped after Barton rolled in agony on the canvas after a flurry of blows in which Durrelle was ruled to have struck Barton in the groin. Durrelle claimed he was disqualified unjustly.

There was some talk of a rematch.

## Acquit Boxer of Manslaughter

PROVIDENCE, R. I. (AP)—Robert L. Holston, 24, middle-weight boxer, was acquitted of a manslaughter charge Tuesday in the death of Jose Contreras, 28-year-old Taunton, Mass., fighter who died May 9, a week after his technical knockout by Holston.

Holston, who fights under the name Bob Bolton, was found innocent after the prosecution had said investigation showed no illegal action.

Assistant solicitor Vincent A. Ragosta told the court that the manslaughter charge was brought because of "tradition," but that his office feels Holston was innocent.

Contreras collapsed in his dressing room after the knockout May 9, and died in hospital after unsuccessful brain surgery.

**Minozo Sent To Hospital**

CHICAGO, (AP)—White Sox outfielder Minnie Minozo, hit by a pitched ball in New York last Wednesday, suffered a dizzy spell Tuesday and was sent to a hospital for observation.

Minozo became faint while eating in a restaurant just prior to the Sox' departure for Cleveland to open a three-game series Tuesday night.

Minozo was felled by a ball thrown by Yankee pitcher Bob Grim which struck him on the cheekbone. At the time, it was feared Minozo might have a severe concussion, but tests showed no apparent injury.

# Pittsburgh Clobbers Brooklyn 15-1; Phils Halt Giants Drive Towards Top Place

PHILADELPHIA, (AP)—Reliever Jack Meyer broke the back of an eighth-inning New York rally as the Philadelphia Phillies defeated the Giants 6-2 Tuesday night. Meyer forced two Giant batters to pop up with the bases jammed when starter Curt Simmons weakened.

Meyer's successful relief stint enabled Simmons to rack up his first win of the year against one loss. The lefthander looked better than he has since he cut his toe with a power mower on the front lawn of his home last summer.

Simmons struck out five and gave up five fairly well scattered hits in his seven and a third-inning chore.

Andy Seminick homered for Philadelphia with no one on base in the eighth with Don Liddle pitching for New York.

CLEVELAND (AP)—Chico Carrasquel and Bob Nieman homered in the eighth inning Tuesday night as the Chicago White Sox chased the Cleveland Indians, 4-1. Billy Pierce held the Indians to three hits for his third victory against two defeats.

Score had a no-hitter going until the seventh inning when Nieman, with one out, singled to centre. Singles by Vern Stephens and Sherm Lollar scored Nieman and gave the Sox a 1-0 lead.

Ralph Kiner tied it up in the bottom half of the same inning with his sixth home run of the year.

But in the eighth, Carrasquel led off with his homer, his fourth this season. A double by John Groth, followed by Nieman's seventh home run accounted for two more runs and the 4-1 decision.

The victory moved Chicago to within a half game of the second place Cleveland.

NEW YORK (AP)—Mickey Vernon's long sacrifice fly brought home the winning run in the ninth Tuesday night as the Washington Senators beat the New York Yankees 3-2 to end the American league leaders seven-game winning streak.

It was pitcher Chuck Stobbs who scored from third on Vernon's deep clout to the right-centre field scoreboard, bringing home the run that gave the 25-year-old southpaw his first victory of the season. He had been beaten three times.

The winning run was charged to Tom Sturdivant, who had relieved starter Bob Grim in the eighth. Vernon's smash, however, was hit off White Ford, who hurried in from the bullpen after Stobbs walked to open the ninth.

The defeat, coming after the Yankees had rallied for a tying run in the eighth, did not reduce New York's one-game lead, however, as Chicago beat runnup Cleveland 4-1.

BALTIMORE (AP)—Jim McDonald pitched six and two-thirds innings of shut out and won his first game as a starter Tuesday night as Baltimore broke a five-game losing streak by beating the Boston Red Sox 6-1 before 13,853 spectators.

Ray Moore's fine relief chore in blanking the Red Sox the final three innings saved the victory for McDonald.

McDonald, obtained in last winter's big deal with the New York Yankees, had pitched only 1-13 innings previously this season because of a variety of physical ailments.

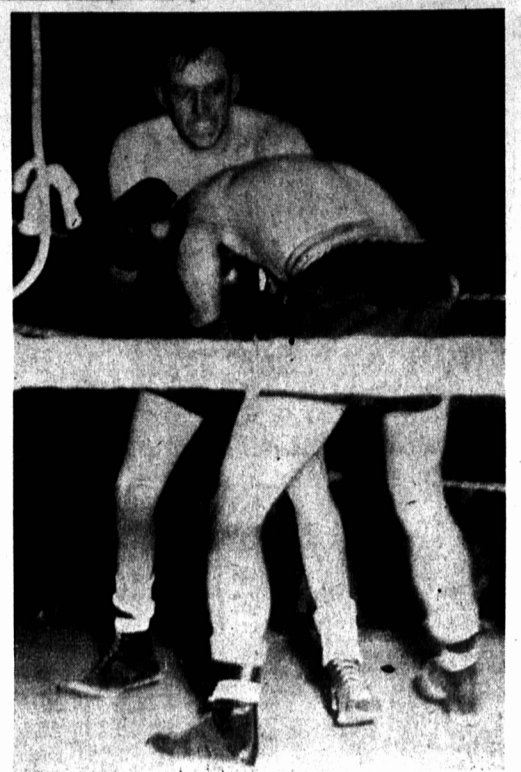

The Orioles got rid of starting pitcher Willard Nixon who has never beaten them in three tries the past two seasons, in the sixth inning by scoring three more runs.

PITTSBURGH (AP)—The seventh place Pittsburgh Pirates snapped an 11-game losing streak Tuesday night by humiliating the league leading Brooklyn Dodgers 15-1. It was the biggest run production for a National League team this season.

Despite the defeat, the Dodgers remained six games ahead of the second place New York Giants who were beaten 6-2 by Philadelphia.
