OTTAWA, Aug. 23 (CP)—The government today urged members of Parliament to head for Ottawa "at the earliest possible moment" for Tuesday's opening of a special session on the railway strike and defence.

The following further communications between the Federal Minister of Transport and the Charlottetown Board of Trade were released for publication yesterday by President Storey: "F. J. Storey, Pres. "Charlottetown Board of Trade "Re further message received. May I point out to you that the undertaking given by the Government of Canada to Prince Edward Island is clearly established and recognized to the effect that efficient service should be maintained between the island and the mainland...

August 22, 1950 The Honorable Louis St. Laurent Prime Minister of Canada Ottawa, Ontario.

Dear Sir: We attach herewith communications received from your Government and would note that the last paragraph of the message dated the 21st is causing this Board concern when compared with your advice of the 19th.

The communication dated the 21st August has been carefully studied and discussed and we now bring to your attention the results of our study. 1. A strike action is not considered comparable to "an Act of God" or even "War". We do not at this time consider any eventuality that might be classed under "other causes."

However, the car ferries at Borden are not part of the Railway system in fact, but are placed under operational control of the C.N.R. The C.N.R. operation of our ferries has always been and still is one of the alternative methods of maintaining the Dominion Government's guarantee to this Province of continuous ferry service.

August 22, 1950 To the Honorable Louis St. Laurent: The Board wishes to make clear that we are not attempting at this time to secure continuation of rail service or in any way interfere with the railway strike. We are concerned only at this time with continuation of the highway service provided by the ferries and recognized under the Trans-Canada Highway agreement as part of such highway.

In view of the very serious situation facing this Province this Board urges you, Sir: 1. Rescind the order which placed the car ferries under the C.N.R. for operation. 2. Place at least the S.S. Prince Edward Island, which is the more readily commissioned, back into service immediately. 3. Improve the service by placing the S.S. Abegweit in operation as soon after as possible.

Is Jakob Malik Threatening General War?

By J. M. Roberts, Jr. Associated Press News Analyst. Students of both language and politics at Lake Success are studying the words of Soviet delegate Jakob Malik in an effort to determine whether he is actually threatening a general war.

Twice during this month of his Security Council presidency the Soviet delegate has made statements which sound much that way. He said Aug. 3 regarding Korea that "the Security Council and the United Nations face a choice between two paths: the path of peace and the path of war."

Malik has been doing a lot of talking about that, too, claiming that Russia's policy is one of peace while everyone else is heading down the war road. He quoted from volume two of the official Soviet history of diplomacy about the "concealment of predatory ends behind noble principles" and "the exploitation of the idea of disarmament and pacifist propaganda for one's own purposes."

It is difficult, in many cases, to tell from an English translation what a Russian means. Because Russians do not think like Britons and Americans, and their words do not mean the same. From Malik's context on the two occasions it is possible to read his words as referring to broadening of the Korean war through involvement of the forces of U. N. members other than the United States. It is also possible to read them as predicting a general war despite Russia's desire to avoid it.

Germans Want More U. S. Troops

BONN, Germany, Aug. 23 (AP)—West German political leaders including Communist Socialists demanded more United States and Allied troops for protection against Communist aggression. American official sources said Washington was considering increasing the American occupation force in Germany.

Motor Launch Makes Trip From Caribou

Loaded down with bread from Caribou, N. S., the motor launch Ran-A-Tan last night tied up at Buntain and Bell's wharf, Charlottetown shortly after eight o'clock with the first boat load of supplies to be ferried in this manner from the mainland since the strike began.

Operated by 18-year-old Robert Vatcher and his mother Mrs. Leonard Vatcher, of Charlottetown, the 48 foot motor launch carried 350 cartons of bread with cartons ranging in size from 20 to 300 loaves. Dealers from Charlottetown and Summerside were on the wharf with trucks awaiting the Ran-A-Tan with her cargo.

Local CNR Picketing Maintained Yesterday In Orderly Manner

Business men of Charlottetown felt the results of the present railway strike yesterday as some of them endeavoured to have prepaid shipments unloaded at the local freight yard. Permission was refused unless the goods were packable and strike officials stated they were waiting for instructions from Moncton as to whether commodities such as coal and flour could be unloaded.

Picketing of the Hotel and the various railway departments is being maintained in an orderly fashion twenty-four hours a day. One of the shipments which was released was a carload of oil for the hospitals. It is understood that the oil is heated when it arrives in Charlottetown and if it should cool must be reheated before it can be used.

The local organization consists of six groups whose chairman are as follows: Canadian Brotherhood of Railway Employees, F. F. Sigworth; Federated Tradesmen, Preston MacLean; Maintenance of Way, Harry Hennessey; Order of Railway Telegraphers, James E. Cameon; Engine Men, Joseph MacAleer; Another group, Running Trades, under the chairmanship of George Ryan, are not members of the union but are out on strike in sympathy with the union members.

Union Leader Makes Statement

MONTREAL, Aug. 23 (CP)—Frank Hall, chairman of the joint negotiating committee of 10 international unions whose 90,000 members are on strike against the railways for more pay, said today "we are facing most difficult and dangerous times and it is of primary importance that railway workers continue their faith in our national institutions and Government."

Four Local Boys Aboard Frigates In Port Here

Four Charlottetown boys are aboard the two frigates of the Royal Canadian Navy which docked at the Railway Wharf yesterday morning. One of the cadets is Sub-Lieutenant Joseph Mahar and the others are Michael Kelly, Joseph O'Leary Duffy and Dallas Santry.

The two frigates comprise task group 213.1, which is under the command of Lieut. Commander T. C. Pullen, Captain of the La Hulouise. The other ship, the Swansea, is under the command of Lieut. Commander John Koring. Approximately 150 officers and men are in the crew of each ship.

Strike Is Problem For Unemployment Insurance Fund

OTTAWA, Aug. 23 (CP)—The rail strike and consequent layoffs of wage-earners has posed a problem in the administration of Canada's Unemployment Insurance Fund. With those idle through the strike or consequent layoffs running into the hundreds of thousands, administrators of the \$580,000,000 fund are faced with the question of who is to draw benefits and who isn't.

Officials of the Unemployment Insurance Commission said today the problem is still being worked out and it is not possible to generalize on all points. But one certainty, they said, is that no benefits will be paid to members of the involved unions employed by the railways.

Payments will be made to workers in other industries laid off because of slowed production as a result of the strike. Biggest puzzle of the present stage, officials said, is the question of treatment for those railway employees who are not on strike but who have been forced into idleness by the tie-up.
