

**A Successful Exhibition.**

The Torontese are rejoicing over the success of their late grand Exhibition. It seems to have been a notable success in almost every way. It was in almost every department well filled. It was more largely attended than any Exhibition ever before held in Ontario, and the financial results were greater than could have been expected. On the latter point a few facts may prove interesting. The managers commenced operations with a debt on costs of building or for recent permanent improvements of \$25,000. The general expense of holding the Exhibition was \$20,000. That is to say, the total amount for which the Association was responsible was \$65,000. The total receipts from all sources was \$52,500. This amount covered all the expense connected with the Exhibition, and left a surplus of \$12,500 toward extinguishing debt on cost of building and permanent improvements. That was certainly a satisfactory result. The total number of visitors footed up 200,000. The buildings are now becoming the property of the Toronto Corporation with a debt on them of \$12,500.

**A SHARP BOY.**—The other day a sharp looking youth walked up quickly to the counter of the post office in a country town and emptying a bag of coppers thereon asked the clerk, who was attending to other customers, for a dollar's worth of one cent stamps.

The night before their Excellencies left Toronto for Ottawa, a colored band serenaded them at Government House during dinner time, and acquitted itself creditably. The members of the band were dined, if not wined, by his Excellency in the servant's hall. Two little colored girls present were presented to the Princess who shook hands with them cordially, accepted bouquets from them and talked to them kindly about their schooling, etc. Such manifestations of interest and sympathy on the part of persons placed as the Marquis and Princess are cost little; but in their effect they count for a great deal.

A sensational story has been going the rounds of the American press to the effect that Mr. Langtry, whose principal title to celebrity is that he is the husband of Mrs. Langtry, was about to bring an action against his wife and the Prince of Wales in the Matrimonial Court. It is pleasing to be able to note the prompt contradiction of the rumor. Mr. Langtry, it is true, intends bringing an action, but not against his wife or the Prince. The defendant will be the proprietor of the English journal which started the canard. Even the husband of a fashionable beauty has rights which the gutter-snipe press must be made to respect.
