Sir Richard Goes to England.

LONDON, Nov. 14.—Sir Michael Hicks-Beach, Chancellor of the Exchequer, speaking in Bristol, said that it would not be his privilege next year to relieve the taxpayers. He wished he could say that he was not about to increase the budget, but the government expenditure had been enormous, especially in South Africa and China. He declared emphatically, however, that the wealth of the Transvaal would have to bear a part of the South African expenses.

HOW THE MONTICELLO WENT DOWN.

Dramatic Story of the Stewardess.

A Halifax despatch of the 12th inst., reports: Kate Smith, the stewardess, was the only woman saved and one of the four only who escaped. She had several rescues from shipwreck. Miss Smith gave your correspondent a story, of which the following is a summary:

"We left St. John on Friday morning. It was very rough. At noon I saw First Officer Newell and I asked him how we were getting along."

"We are getting along all right now. I do not know what we will meet before we get to Yarmouth, but I think we will come out all right."

In the evening the boat shipped a sea which broke in the forward bulkhead of the forward saloon. I was in my room, but came out when I heard the crash. It flooded the whole forward saloon.

I told Elsie McDonald that we would have to take to the boats on Saturday morning. All through the night the boat pitched and rolled heavy.

She was listed considerably to port, and at times it was difficult to make one's way about.

Saturday forenoon Mr. Eldridge came in. He seemed agitated and asked me if I was frightened. I told him I was not the least afraid, and for him not to get so, as it was the worst thing he could do. He said: "All I can say is God will take care of us. My people do not know I am on the boat."

He went away, but returned and asked if I thought he had better put on a life preserver. I told him if he thought he ought to he had better do so.

Mr. Poole, the second engineer, came up to where Purser Hilton and I was sitting after this. I heard the pump going and asked if the engines were all right. I asked him if she was leaking. He said:

"She is leaking a little, but don't be afraid."

Then Chief Engineer Greig came along and told me to put on my thick clothing. He said the water was putting out the fires. The engines had been stopped. I was told quite early in the morning that distress signals were flying. The last thing I saw when I left the ship was the ensign union down on the foremast. Several officers and sailors told me to get ready to take the boats as they were going to get ready. There was no excitement. We then went out to the aft deck. All the four men—Murphy, Cook, Flemming and Captain Smith—were in a boat which was hanging from the davits. One of the sailors, William Dunn, secured us on the rail, and we watched our chance to jump as the steamer rolled upward. The boat was pushed away from the side in a sea such as I never saw in all my life. When we left the other boat was in the water and seemed to be full of men. The third boat was hanging in the davits. Five minutes after we left the ship she went over on her side, and I heard somebody say "She broken in twain."

I suppose she took the other boats with her when she sank, because I saw nothing more of them. Captain Harding was getting ready to get into his boat when we left. As the ship went down I saw Beecher Hopkins, Levi Nickerson, Walton Cunningham, Austin Wickins, Fred and Wynne Vanemburg standing on the rail.

Captain Harding was standing on the deck. As the ship broke in two I heard an agonized scream that I shall never forget as long as I live.

"The rest is a blank to me until I felt myself in the water. I was washed up on the beach twice. While I was in the water I saw a rock toward which I was being carried, and I put out my arm and warded it off.

There were on board forty all told, including eight passengers.
