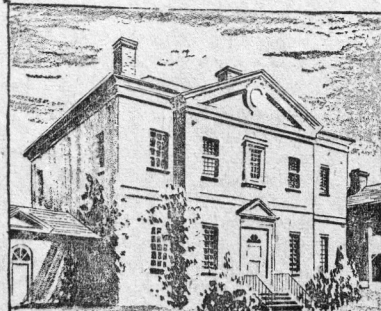
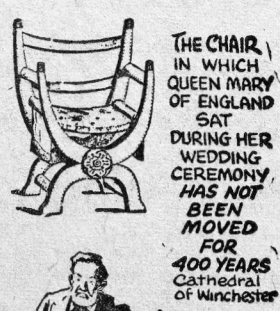


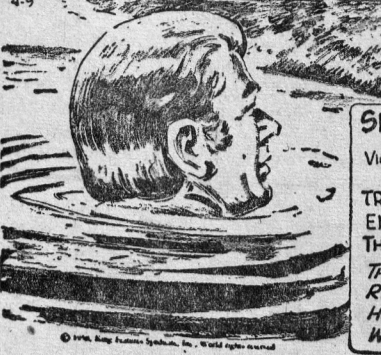
RIPELEY'S BELIEVE IT OR NOT

The bidding:
South West North East

Too often, the partner of the pre-emptive bidder responds when he shouldn't, either from a sense of desperation because he does not fit the opener's suit, or because he doesn't realize how weak the opening bidder's hand is liable to be.

The partner of the three bidder is well advised to give up hope of a game unless he has, at the very best, better than a sound opening bid of his own.

The play of the hand also contains an instructive point. The club lead was taken with the ace and a trump was led from dummy. East played low and the king won the trick, West playing the seven.

A low diamond was returned, East taking the ace. Declarer eventually made the contract, losing one trick in each suit.

An error was made in the defense. West should have dropped either the ten or jack of diamonds on declarer's king. When he played the seven instead, South was left with no alternative but to play back a low diamond and hope the ace would fall.

But suppose West had played the ten on the king. Declarer might then very easily have reasoned that West's holding originally was J-10 alone, in which case the play of the queen would fell the jack and ace together. Two trump tricks would then have been lost instead of one.

West gave South no chance to go wrong.

Opening lead—queen of clubs. There are two points of interest in this deal which was played in a rubber bridge game.

First we can take note of the bidding which, simple as it was, is worthy of attention. The three diamond bid, a shot in the dark, was an open acknowledgement of a weak hand. Its purpose was to hamper the opponents in their exchange of information in case they had a big hand between them.

With the outstanding high cards being fairly evenly divided among the other players, it turned out that South bought the contract.

North's pass is of particular interest, since it evinced a full appreciation of South's bid. all

Strike Will Affect CBC In Small Way

TORONTO (CP)—The CBC said Monday it will be affected only "in a small way" by the United States-wide strike of 1,300 Columbia Broadcasting System engineers, cameramen and other radio and television technicians.

A spokesman said the corporation had received no word of program interruption from the American network and would take whatever filmed substitutes are used for live CBS TV shows. Non-union and supervisory personnel managed to get out most of CBS' scheduled live shows.

The strike forced the cancellation of a live one-hour drama from New York (Westinghouse Studio One) Monday night but CBS planned to fill the period with a kinescope of last week's show. The CBC said it would carry the kinescope and would carry any others that showed up as replacements.

Radio station CFRB, a privately-owned outlet in Toronto, carries certain CBC radio shows but it was not immediately known what effect the strike would have on its programming—if any.
