### S'side Kinsmen Proud Record Of Service Work

In the Association of Kinsmen Clubs this is National Kinsmen Week which has been set aside to acquaint the Canadian people with the activities and service work of clubs of the association in the various communities which they serve.

To see that this is carried out systematically committees have been set up on a district and club level. Committee chairman for this district which takes in the four Atlantic Provinces is Norman Hogg of Summerside and chairman of the committee of the Summerside club is Dick Henthorn.

The regular meeting of the club on Tuesday evening was arranged to carry out Summerside's part of the program. The Summerside club is now eleven years old and its membership is 37, the highest in its history. Club president is Jim Harris and the president-elect who will take office on September 1st is Dr. J. A. Doiron.

During the past years the club has a proud history of service work performed for the community. Its first major project soon after the granting of its charter was the installation of the radio system in the rooms of the two Summerside schools. As these schools were expanded in the years that followed, the systems were expanded to keep pace.

The club was prepared to put a radio system in the new school now under construction but it was found that this equipment was part of the contract of the construction company. One of the major projects of the

club has been participation in youth sport, and in fact most of its various activities have been concerned with the young people of the community. In its earlier years hockey and baseball teams were sponsored and two Maritime hockey championships were brought home before the club dropped this part of its service work. However, a little league baseball team is still sponsored.

Another project of major importance has been the installation of wading pools in the Queen Elizabeth Park playground and the Notre Dame Street playground. This summer the club will install a wading pool in the proposed playground on Harvard Street. These playgrounds have been equipped with slides, tilts and other items by the Kinetite Club which is composed of wives of Kinsmen.

The Summerside Kinsmen Club has several annual projects, two of which are carried out at Christmas time. One is known as the Kinsmen Christmas tree, and is a program by which donations of food, clothing, toys and money are received and these are made up into boxes and delivered to the homes of less fortunate families on Christmas eve.

The other Christmas project is the toy matinee by which toys are collected and delivered to the two orphanages in Charlottetown. Another annual project that has been the object of much praise is the Halloween children's party which is held to entertain the children and keep them out of mischief.

For approximately nine years the Kinsmen Club operated an out door rink, and it was only this past winter that a decision was made to discontinue this project because it was thought it was no longer necessary with the new civic stadium in operation.

Over the years this club has made many donations to worthy causes but in the main it has followed the policy of spending money raised on its own programs. The main fund raising projects have been the harvest ball, the annual bingo, and a carnival. The people of the community have always been most generous in their support of these activities.

The club has played a full part in the life of the community and it looks forward to even greater accomplishments in the years that lie ahead.

The Kinsmen Club is essentially a young men's organization and for the most part this club has shown the zest and enthusiasm that is characteristic of youth.

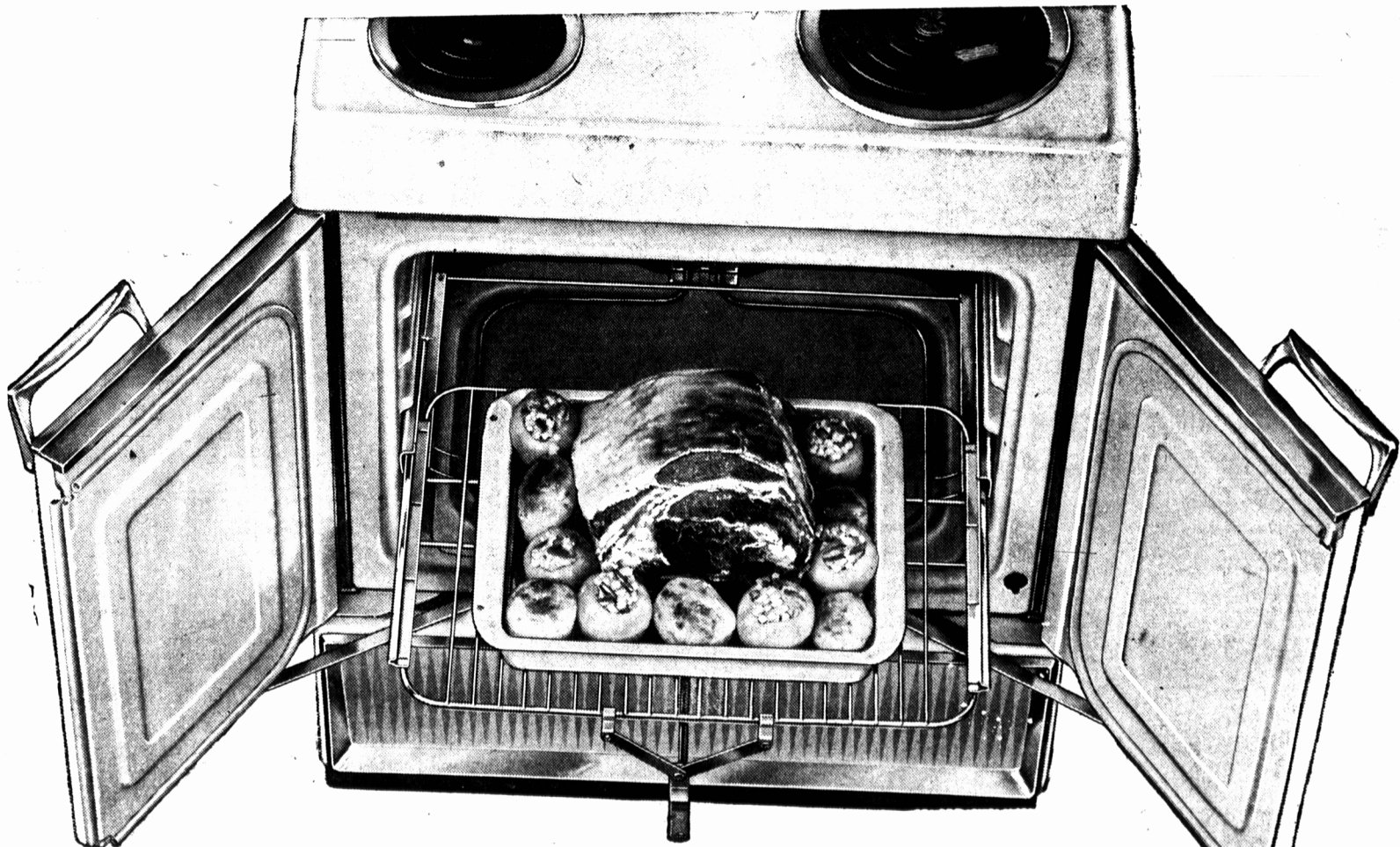

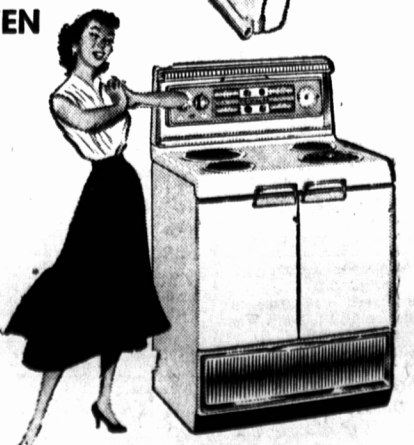
