**S'side Rotary Club Meeting**

Summerside Rotary Club was held yesterday at noon to representatives in Summerside who are interested in and taking part in the movement for the betterment of the boys and girls of the Town. At a banquet held at Coyle's Restaurant, presided over by past president William Hayward in the absence of the president, Dr. Lockhart, the members of Rotary heard reports from the different organizations on what they were doing and what they proposed to do in the future. The program was part of the Boys and Girls Week being sponsored by the Rotary Club and was in charge of Rotarians Lowell Hancock and William Hayward.

During the delicious lobster dinner the members and guests were entertained by several top performers in the recent Musical Festival including Bessie Darby and Margaret Shaw in a piano solo. Merle and Carol Elderkin in a vocal solo and with Mrs. Cleve Whelan as accompanist and Hubert Crockettie in a piano solo.

Rotarian Lowell Hancock in his address to the members outlined the objects of Boys and Girls Week which he said are "to call attention to the potentialities and problems of youth to give impetus to year around programmes of character building for the general welfare of boys and girls and to acquaint the public with the agencies which are serving these purposes."

Representing the Town, His Worship Henry W. Wedge complimented the Club on the sponsorship of Boys and Girls Week. He enumerated the ways the Town is combating juvenile delinquency, by providing a splendid playground at the north of the Town, another at the west end section and another in prospect at the east end. He referred to the help the town has given to the Legion Band to which young men may belong and form a keen appreciation of music. He paid high tribute to the service clubs for the great work they are doing. The net result of all this, he believed, would be healthier and happier children in the Town.

Mr. Clarence Mercer, superintendent of the High School also had words of approval for the Rotary Club for its magnificent interest in youth. He outlined the work the school is doing and paid tribute to a very efficient staff of teachers at Summerside High.

Representing St. Mary's Convent and St. Paul's Church, Mr. E. P. Foley spoke of the unselfish work being done by the Sisters

at the Convent for the children under their care, teaching them not only the three R's but instructing them also in sewing, music and the arts as well. They are hampered greatly, he pointed out, by lack of funds and were this not so, their good work would be ever so much greater.

Rev. Donald MacKay, minister of the Presbyterian Church, who represented the different Protestant churches in Summerside said he felt privileged to do so.

"Of all the other movements for boys and girls," he said, "the church comes first for the aim of the church is to bring boys and girls face to face with God. They then have a new sense of values and are able to discriminate between right and wrong. The church comes first in the development of the children," he said.

Miss Gladys Holman, speaking for the Summerside branch of the Red Cross referred to the many activities and the work done by the Red Cross, the sick room loan service, swimming, life saving, first aid classes and she was high in her praise of those leaders in Summerside who are actively engaged in this work.

Mrs. D. C. Tompkins represented the local Girl Guides, Mr. Eric Tanton the Boy Scouts, Mr. Charles Linkletter, the Schurman School Parade, James Hogan, the Physical Fitness Department, Dr. Hillard Clark, the Y's Men's Club, Mr. Gregory Mulholland the Kinsman Club.

In closing Rotarian William Hayward thanked the representatives of the different clubs and said that while Rotary was not actually engaged in this work provided funds for their continuance.—S.
