These Grosbeaks will ever revisit a district. Their comings and goings are unpredictable.

Early in 1940 an exhaustive study of the Evening Grosbeak by James Baillie, Jr., of Toronto, was published in the Canadian Field-Naturalist. There we are taken back to "about 1896" when this bird was reported to be nesting in the Peace River district of Alberta.

Apparently these birds breed, though everywhere irregularly, within a narrow belt running from Western Alberta to Massachusetts, and stay on their nesting grounds from about mid-May to mid-September. Now we are making efforts to find the nests that must be about 5 miles south of Ste. Agathe, and Cap a l'Aigle, Quebec, because in both these districts young birds were being fed cherries in 1951.

Because of its fast-growing and hardy properties, the Manitoba maple, a native of our Prairie Provinces, has been planted extensively across the country during this century. About 1920 a dozen baby trees were started in the favoured Ste. Agathe district.
