

TELEGRAPHIC NEWS.

CANADIAN.

OTTAWA, Dec. 10.

Gagnon has been declared elected by one majority for Kamouraska.

Abraham J. Lunt has been appointed Preventive Officer at Fosket, N. S.

The candidates, Mr. Dumais and Mr. St. Hilaire, were nominated for Ch'coind yesterday. They both support the Government.

An Ogilvie patent process flour mill, with a daily capacity of six hundred barrels, is being pushed rapidly to completion in Winnipeg.

Hon. Mr. Masson, who left for France some months ago in quest of health, has improved greatly, with the prospect of a complete recovery.

The appointment of Mr. Edgar Dowdrey, Commissioner of Indian Affairs, as Lieut. Governor of the North West Territory, is gazetted.

J. L. Proctor, a young man employed as a stove-blacker in Victoria, British Columbia, recently received information from Ireland that he had fallen heir to \$5000.000.

There was a meeting of the Canada Pacific Railway Company to-day, at Montreal, to confer with the promoters of the Emerson and North-Western Railway.

Mr. Leapfrog has secured a syndicate to undertake the construction of the Huron and Ontario ship canal, and wants ten million acres of land in the disputed territory of Ontario as a subsidy for the work.

The Deputy Minister of Marine and Fisheries has gone to Washington on business connected with the department. He will be absent three weeks. It is said that a company can be formed to light the city by electricity, if the corporation will pay \$10,000 per annum for the service.

Mr. Gregory is suing the directors of the Canada Improvement Company, and Sir Hugh Allan for \$100,000. The amount is claimed to be due for work done on the Eastern Extension Railway in Nova Scotia. The case opened yesterday in the Supreme Court at Montreal.

Notice is given that the Grand Trunk Railway Company will apply to Parliament for an Act to authorize the Company to purchase, lease or amalgamate with any line of railway whose line intersects any part of their line.

The total liabilities of Banks acting under charter in the Dominion on November 30th was \$139,032,334.53, and the total assets, \$213,178,065.42.

Hon. D. Schultz, who arrived yesterday from Winnipeg, reports good sleighing throughout the province, which is facilitating very much the movement of the heavy wheat crop to market. Buyers from Montreal, Chicago and Toronto, keenly contest in price; and large quantities of grain are being stored at Winnipeg, Emerson, Portage, La Prairie and Carman city.

UNITED STATES.

New York, Dec. 10.

The steamship "City of New York," from Liverpool, reports a continuous hurricane and high seas the entire passage; lost and smashed boats, broke wheel house, and stove after house and washed a boy overboard named Chas. Asberry, and injured several seamen. The passengers were not on deck for several days.

Bass River Harbor, Mass., Dec. 11. Captain Williams of the English schooner Buccoo, from St. John, N.B., for New York, with lumber, reports: Cleared St. John Nov. 19; experienced southerly head winds and about dusk last night, when off Nansett Light, Cape Cod, in jibing mainboom, carried away bits, etc., the mainboom striking a sailor named Peter McDonald on the side of the head, making him unconscious. He remained in this state all night, when he regained his senses. As soon as possible the captain came ashore and obtained medical assistance. The sailor will probably recover.

GREAT BRITAIN AND IRELAND. London, Dec. 9. A private interview took place to-day, between the Lord Mayor and a deputation of the Property Defence Association. The Lord Mayor has written to the press, trusting that a committee which will be formed next week and composed of men of eminence and position and devoid of all political bias, will raise such a fund as will effectually assist the loyalists in Ireland.

The str. Daniel Stienmann, from Antwerp Nov. 30 for New York, put into this port. She has lost her boats and her decks were swept.

LONDON, Dec. 11. The Lord Mayor, on behalf of the citizens of London, telegraphs condolence with friends of the victims of the Vienna fire.

LONDON, Dec. 11. The Government balloon, in charge of Capt. Templar, accompanied by Walter Powell, member of Parliament, and Mr. Gardner, ascended from Bath yesterday and descended at Bridesport. The balloon struck the ground heavily and Gardner and Capt. Templar were thrown out and injured. The balloon then rose with Powell and was seen again to descend at sea. Nothing has since been heard of the balloon or Powell.

LONDON, Dec. 11. The Grand Orange Lodge of Ireland has issued a circular condemning the Land League and pointing out that in the United Kingdom and its colonies there are thousands and thousands of Orangemen ready to fight on the constitution.

EUROPEAN.

VIENNA, Dec. 9, (midnight.)

The extent of the calamity has been much underrated, 1,130 persons being announced at the Police Bureau as missing, and assuming that many of these will turn up, it is feared the total loss will not be much less than 1,000. It is now probable that there were 600 in the fourth gallery. All the persons in the third row of the parquette perished. Some persons who entered the theatre a few minutes after the fire was discovered remain in the theatre halls 2,500. Every place occupied except the parquette, was consequently the total loss of boxes be nearly 1,000.
