

Ottawa Rallies Twice To Take Saskatchewan 18-8

OTTAWA (CP) — Ottawa Rough Riders scored early and late to defeat Saskatchewan Roughriders 18-8 in a Canadian Football League interlocking game Monday night.

Ottawa struck for a first-quarter touchdown on a 41-yard off-tackle run by fullback Jim Dillard and finished with a three-yard touchdown run by halfback Bo Scott on the final play of the game.

Tackle Moe Racine booted a 13-yard field goal and a single as well as two converts. Flanker Hugh Campbell scored an unconverted touchdown for Saskatchewan. The Western Conference club also had a safety.

Scott's touchdown triggered a mob scene on the field as hundreds of the 22,954 spectators poured from the stands. Both teams cleared their benches and headed for the dressing room, but referee Seymour Wilson managed to clear the field in about five minutes and the

teams returned for the convert.

Als Plan No Changes For Game Tonight

MONTREAL (CP) — He and coach Darrell Mudra of Montreal Alouettes watched their next opponents—B.C. Lions—on television Sunday and did some closer watching on film Monday, but so far he hasn't seen anything that will make him change his plans.

The Western Football Conference Lions dropped a close 29-27 decision to Toronto's Argonauts Sunday and meet the Als here tonight in a non-television game.

"Our game plans are pretty well set," Mudra said. "I watched the game Monday and we've been looking at some film."

Mudra said the Als game preparation has been "good" for this one and he feels "any last minute change will only up-

set the pattern he has established in the Montrealers 10-day layoff.

The Als are currently in third spot in the Eastern Conference, nursing a 3-5 record and six points, just a scant two more than the Argos. B.C. is resting in last place in the west with a 2-7 mark.

STILL NOT READY

Mudra said Donnie Davis will be moved outside even though fullback J. W. Lockett won't be back against the Lions. Lockett broke his arm in the season-opener against Ottawa Rough Riders and will remain on the injury reserve list for another 10 days.

"We'll use Davis primarily on the outside, which will make him more of a threat," Mudra said.

Davis' spot at slotback will be taken over by end Mike Gibbons, while Gerry Sternberg and Peter Kempf will share the flanker chores.

George Bork is likely to get the starting assignment at quarterback, with Bernie Faloney being pushed to the fore if the slender Bork fails to move the team.

"We'll dress both of them and we'll follow no set pattern in how we use them," Mudra said.

Robinson Closes On Triple Crown

NEW YORK (AP) — A .422 batting performance last week has virtually assured Frank Robinson of becoming the first major leaguer to win a triple crown in 10 years.

The Baltimore Orioles slugger had 10 hits in 22 times at bat while the Orioles were clinching the American League pennant. It lifted Robinson's batting average six points to .316.

Tony Oliva of Minnesota Twins, defending titleholder who led by one point a week ago, slipped into the runner-up spot. His average fell four points to .307, the result of only four safeties in 21 tries.

Robinson holds a commanding lead in home runs and runs batted in.

He claimed four homers and drove in 13 runs last week, boosting his totals to 49 homers and 120 RBI.

KILBRETT SECOND

Harmon Killebrew of Minnesota is second in home runs with 36. Boog Powell, another Orioles' slugger, is No. 2 in RBI with 107.

The figures include Sunday's games.

Matty Alou of Pittsburgh continues to lead the National League in batting. He lost one point to .345 last week, collecting eight hits in 24 attempts. However, he leads brother Felipe Alou of Atlanta Braves by 15 points.

Hank Aaron of Atlanta remained the NL's home run and RBI leader. He had three homers and six runs batted in last week, giving him season totals of 42 home runs and 122 RBI.

Giants Bomb Atlanta; Red Sox, Senators Split

ATLANTA (AP) — Willie McCovey and Tom Haller accounted for five runs on homers as San Francisco Giants bombed Atlanta Braves 8-2 Monday night.

It was the 24th victory for Juan Marichal, who also accounted for two San Francisco runs with a double in the eighth. Marichal, who was making his first appearance of the season against the Braves, has lost six.

McCovey belted his 35th homer in the first with Willie Mays on base.

Haller's three-run homer, his 27th, in the fourth, increased the lead to 5-0.

WASHINGTON (AP) — Don Lock's two-run homer in the seventh Monday gave Washington Senators a 3-2 victory over Boston Red Sox in the second game of a doubleheader watched by 485 fans.

The Red Sox won the opener 5-0 behind the seven-hit pitching of Darrell Brandon.

Ken McMullen of the Senators set an American League record for third basemen with 11 assists in the first game. He also tied the major league mark shared by four National Leaguers.

Lock's home run—his 16th of the season—off reliever Don McMahon followed a single by Frank Howard and a sacrifice by Ken Harrelson.

Dalton Jones was the Red Sox's batting star in the opener. He had three hits and drove in three runs, helping Brandon record his eighth victory against St. Louis.

ST. LOUIS (AP) — Ron Fairly slugged three hits, as Los Angeles Dodgers whipped St. Louis Cardinals 6-3 in the torrid National League pennant race.

Czechs Win World Gymnastics Ch'ship

DORTMUND, West Germany (AP) — Czechoslovakia, with a great performance from Vera Caslavskva, won the world women's gymnastic championship Saturday, beating defending champion Russia by a fraction.

Miss Caslavskva won the gold medal for all-around competition as her team finished a microscopic 0.038 of a point ahead of Russia.

Earlier it had appeared the Russian women had the championship sewed up. They had topped the Japanese team 383.387 to 380.923. Japan had defeated Russia the day before for the men's title.

Japan was third in the women's championship decided only

after the last vault by the brilliant Miss Caslavskva.

Canada was down in the standings. Her best performance came from Sandra Hartley of north Vancouver, B.C., who had 70.763 points for all-around competition. Miss Hartley, 17, was third in the Canadian championships in Winnipeg this year. She was the only member of the team to top 70.

The championship was halted for an hour when the 6,000 spectators in the Westfalenhalle booed a jury decision on a dazzling parallel bar performance by United States Olympic candidate Doris Brause.

RATING ROUSES CROWD

The crowd stomped, hooted and booed after a point rating of 9.766 was announced. Highest possible rating in each event is 10.

Miss Brause received thunderous applause when she performed a difficult series of handstands, backward somersaults and twists on the bars.

A protest was lodged by the official of the American Gymnastic Federation but after a review the score stayed the same.

Miss Caslavskva scored a total of 238 points to add the world all-around gold medal to the Olympic gold medal she won at Tokyo.

Griffith Signs For Return Bout

NEW YORK (AP) — Middleweight champion Emile Griffith and Joey Archer of New York signed contracts Monday for a return title bout at Madison Square Garden Oct. 21.

The 28-year-old Griffith will set a record of engaging in three middleweight title fights within a six-month span. He won the 160-pound division crown from Dick Tiger on April 25 and outpointed Archer in his first defense at the Garden July 13.

Griffith is the first fighter to win the welterweight title three times.

Griffith will get a guarantee of \$75,000 or 45 per cent of all receipts. Archer will get 15 per cent of the receipts.

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Rally Scheduled For 2 PM Sunday

The P.E.I. Motor Sport Club, "Gymkhana" in Charlottetown that attracted a good entry and many spectators, is putting on a rally next Sunday that has been described by the organizers as "especially suitable for beginning rallyists"—that is, for people who have never entered a rally before, or at any rate have limited experience.

A rally is a navigational trial—a car, with driver and navigator, has to follow a predetermined route at a set average speed. At various "checkpoints" along the route the cars have to stop and have their cards marked by a marshal, and the time on these cards determine their finishing status in the rally.

One thing that a rally most definitely is NOT is a race. The competing cars leave the start at one minute intervals, and are thus well spread out. The required average speeds are always well below the legal limit, and speeding is definitely discouraged—competitors can lose points for being early, as well as late at checkpoints.

By the way of equipment, very little is needed for simple rallies like the forthcoming one. A couple of pencils, some scrap paper, a ruler and a watch with a sweep second hand are all that is needed.

Next Sunday's rally, named "The Clam Shell Caper" will start at the Crapaud Curling Club, and competitors should be there by 2 p.m. It runs some 75 miles, mainly over paved and the better clay roads. All are welcome, and the organizers stress that if you have never participated in this exciting form of Motor Sport, then this rally is just what you need.

73 Amateurs, Pros Seek Berths In Canadian Open

VANCOUVER (CP) — While 73 professionals and amateurs slugged away Monday for 40 remaining berths in the \$100,000 Canadian open golf tournament, the more than 100 exempted players divided their time between practice, fishing and generally loafing.

Many of the top touring pros passed up practice sessions, preferring to wait for Wednesday's Pro-Am tournament that precedes Thursday's opening of the four-day Canadian Open.

Doug Sanders stroked away Sunday on the practice fairway and later said the 5,907-yard, 71-par layout at the Shaughnessy Golf and Country club was a classic course.

The gently-rolling course lies alongside the Fraser River in the fashionable Marine Drive area of Vancouver.

Another pro who took advantage of the opportunity, to sharpen his game was Tommy Jacobs.

Many of the touring pros arrived Sunday and Monday fresh from the Seattle-Everett Open in Washington State.

Among them was rookie Romero Blancas, who won \$6,000 and got his maiden victory in the event.

Jack Nicklaus was among the pros who felt Wednesday's Pro-Am event would provide the only reconnaissance of the course needed.

Each professional will play with three amateurs, who paid \$200 each for the game. Amateurs receive full handicap and the best ball score is expected to be about 14 under par.

Hollywood personalities including Bing Crosby, Rod Sterling, and Jim Backus will be among those competing in the Pro-Am.
