

# Britain Reported Hopeful After Exploratory Talks

LONDON (CP)—Britain is reported to be gaining support for its proposal that a Commonwealth prime ministers' conference on Rhodesia, originally planned for July, be put off until September to provide more time for the Anglo-Rhodesian discussions.

The second round of these exploratory talks is to be announced this weekend with indications that the senior civil servants involved will gather in Salisbury this time instead of London.

An informant close to British Prime Minister Wilson Friday expressed cautious optimism about these secret discussions and said the fact that they have not broken down is significant. He denied, however, that Wilson is firmly committed to seeking a compromise with Smith, whose white-minority regime seized independence from Britain last year.

## ZAMBIA OPPOSED

Zambia, a Negro-ruled Central African neighbor of Rhodesia, is opposed to a postponement of the July timetable, fixed when Commonwealth leaders met at Lagos, Nigeria, last January. At that time Wilson believed economic sanctions would bring down the Smith regime in a matter of weeks.

At first Zambia did not fully cooperate in those sanctions, fearing a cut-off of bilateral trade with Rhodesia would cripple the Zambian economy. Now Zambian President Kenneth Kaunda has taken drastic measures, even to the point of freezing foreign exchange holdings normally shared with Rhodesia.

Rhodesian retaliatory action has virtually crippled vital exports of Zambian copper by rail.

Zambian Foreign Minister Simon Kapwepwe, arriving in London from New York, told reporters Friday he still believes the Anglo-Rhodesian talks constitute a "British sell-out" to the 200,000 whites who control

## Minister Not Ready To Concede

OTTAWA (CP)—External Affairs Minister Martin has told the Commons he is not ready to concede that economic sanctions against Rhodesia have failed.

He is not aware of any British announcement to that effect, he said in reply to H. W. Herdige (NDP), Kootenay West, who referred to press reports that the British are seeking a negotiated settlement with the breakaway Ian Smith government.

Mr. Martin said the talks between the British and Rhodesia were for the purpose of establishing whether there is a basis for settlement of the dispute.

The British position, as far as he knows, is firm—it cannot condone the illegal unilateral declaration of independence of Rhodesia. The "economic pressure" on Rhodesia continues, he said.

Gordon Churchill (PC—Winnipeg South Centre) said the sanctions had failed and asked whether the Canadian government would agree that educating the Africans is the key to a solution.

"I cannot admit that the sanctions have failed," repeated Mr. Martin. "That does not seem to be so."

Canada had no objection to the return of nine Canadian teachers to Rhodesia. He said they had left the country not because of a government order but by their own decision.

He said the prime ministers' conference at Lagos had been education of Africans

# Big Business Is Blasted For Slow Centennial Plans

OTTAWA (CP)—The centennial commission has blasted big business and its lack of plans for Canada's 1967 birthday celebrations.

An associate Commissioner Georges E. Gauthier, speaking at the sixth annual meeting of the Canadian Centennial Council, said the extent of private plans is unimpressive.

It was astonishing that only 135 of the 935 companies and non-profit groups belonging to the council planned something special.

Even more astonishing was the fact the non-profit groups were showing more initiative and generosity than the 50 businesses that are council members.

Non-profit groups were trying to raise \$18,000,000 for 100 projects while only 35 firms were planning to put a total of \$11,000,000 into projects of their own.

## Deputy Minister Issues Statement

KUALA LUMPUR (AP)—Deputy Prime Minister Tun Abdul Razak of Malaysia said Indonesia's undeclared war against his country has "officially" ended.

This is proved, he said, by the unprecedented visit of an Indonesian goodwill mission of military men, most of them connected with the "crush Malaysia" command, which directed the confrontation begun three years ago.

The eight-man mission brought word from Indonesian strongman Lt. Gen. Suharto that the military authorities in power in Jakarta sincerely want to end the feud with Malaysia, Razak said.

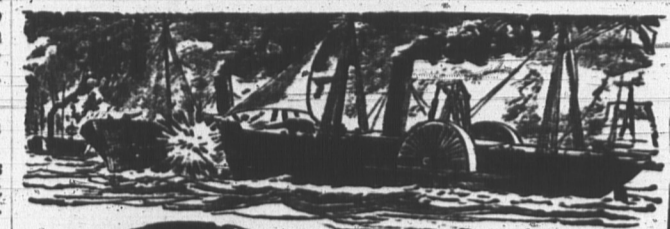
The deputy premier told a press conference the visit did much to remove any doubts Malaysia may have had about peace talks in Bangkok, Thailand, between Razak and Indonesian Foreign Minister Adam Malik, scheduled to begin Monday.

EXPRESSES CONFIDENCE  
Razak said he is confident the talks will succeed and added half-jokingly that now there is "nothing very much to be discussed."

The Indonesian military delegation arrived Friday morning aboard an Indonesian Air Force transport that had been given special clearance by the Malaysians in secret arrangements said to have been conducted on a rush basis in Bangkok.

The officers, led by Rear Admiral O. B. Sjaaf, spent seven hours here in the northern Malaysian town of Alor Star, in discussions with Malaysian leaders.

Here is an unusual example of expert misbidding which occurred in the Trials played in Miami Beach in 1963.

Participating were many of the outstanding pairs in the country, all of them trying to earn a berth on the team which would represent the United States in the forthcoming World Bridge Olympiad, and none of them arriving at the sound contract of six hearts.

When you look at the North-South cards, you see that twelve tricks are very likely if East has the king of diamonds or West has the king of hearts. Of course, it can be argued that the slam therefore involves an element of risk, but the risk is obviously worth taking. In the actual case, North loses only a diamond.

It does seem that the slam should have been reached, even though North-South have only 27 high-card points. Here is how the bidding actually went:
