Cetewayo Restored.

LONDON, Dec. 14. The arrangement recently concluded with Cetewayo provides that he shall, early in January, be installed King of Zululand.

Governmental Changes.

LONDON, Dec. 14. The Right Hon. W. E. Gladstone has resigned the Chancellorship of the Exchequer. He will be succeeded in that office by the Right Hon. Hugh E. C. Childers.

Irish Prosecutions and Arrests.

LONDON, Dec. 14. The prosecutions entered against Davitt, Healy, and Quinn, are likely to be abandoned. Three very important arrests have been made in connection with the Phoenix Park Tragedy.

Fire at Hampton Court.

LONDON, Dec. 14. There has been a destructive fire at Hampton Court Palace. The pictures were saved.

Fire and Loss of Life in Dublin.

DUBLIN, Dec. 14. The co-operative stores of this city were destroyed by a fire last night. The caretaker and his family perished in the flames.

Montreal's Increased Trade.

MONTREAL, Dec. 15. The arrival of ocean vessels at this port during the past season numbered 684—an increase of 139 over the ocean vessels of last year.

Marine Disaster.

HALIFAX, Dec. 14. The schooner "Mary B." Benoit, from Charlottetown, for Halifax, struck McNab's Island, this morning, and is a total wreck. [The "Mary B." is owned in Bourgeois, N. S. She was loaded with 3,800 bushels potatoes, by A. McDonald of West River.]

ANOTHER DISASTER.—The brig, Corinne, which left this port on Sunday last, was driven into Antigonish Bay where she dragged her anchors, and her spars had to be cut away. She was bound for St. John's Newfoundland, with a cargo of pork.

GENERAL CABLE NEWS.

OTTAWA, Dec. 13. The fourth session of the Ontario Legislature was opened this afternoon by Lieut.-Gov. Robinson with the usual ceremonies. The most gratifying thing mentioned in the speech is the anticipation of a million dollars revenues from timber dues and crown lands during the present year.

It is expected that at the expiration of the arrangement between the Pullman Car Co. and the Grand Trunk next year, the Grand Trunk will run its own sleepers.

SAN FRANCISCO, Dec. 13.

Col. Fourtelotte, United States Army, who was detailed by Gen. Sherman to accompany the Vice-Regal party, states that the request for an escort to accompany the party from here to Texas was made by him to the War Department without solicitation or knowledge of the Gov.-Gen. Col. Fourtelotte thought the party would enjoy the trip better and feel less nervous in the Indian country if some such precaution was taken.

OTTAWA, Dec. 13.

It is said the Vice-Regal party, now in San Francisco, have received threatening letters.

DUBLIN, Dec. 13.

Patrick Higgins was to-day found guilty of participation in murder of two Huddys at Lough Mask, and sentenced to be hung next month.

LONDON, Dec. 13.

Advices from South Africa says that Cetewayo has signed Zulu settlement and will return to Zululand early in January. A British resident and military escort will accompany him.

CONSTANTINOPLE, Dec. 13.

The Sultan has had built for his use an armoured carriage, bullet and grenade proof.

LONDON, Dec. 13.

The condition of Postmaster-General Fawcett this morning is more favourable.

LONDON, Dec. 13.

The Colonial office will send Col. Crossman to Jamaica as Royal Commissioner to enquire into the condition of the finances of the colony.

NEW YORK, Dec. 13.

The steamer "Saber," aground on south-west spit two days, got off this morning and proceeded to her dock apparently uninjured.

LONDON, Dec. 13.

The Russian barque "Constantin" from Newcastle, N. B., Nov. 10th for Nice, has been towed to Malaga partially dismantled, in a sinking condition, with cargo damaged. She was cut to the water's edge in collision off Gibraltar.

LONDON, Dec. 13.

The Times' Dublin correspondent telegraphs that the case against Healey and others has been postponed, owing to the absence of Judges from assizes. It would not occasion a surprise if proceedings against them were allowed to drop.

VIENNA, Dec. 13.

Peepar says an anti-terrorist association, the object of which is to oppose the projects of Nihilists, has been formed at St. Petersburg. Branches have been established at Paris, Nice, Geneva, Zurich, London, Berlin, Bucharest and Constantinople.

LONDON, Dec. 13.

The Times this morning, on the occasion of the 50th anniversary of Gladstone's entrance into public life, prints a retrospect of over six columns, of his career. Many political associations have felicitated Gladstone and nearly all the London papers, and a greater portion of the provincial press devote leaders to the subject.

MONEY.—By private advices from Halifax, we have the following: "Stock market very dull. Montreal stocks very weak, but showing signs of recovery. In local stocks, holders of same are more anxious to sell than to buy. American exchange selling at par; and, in this respect money is firm.

JAMES S. MACDONALD, Banker and Broker, who lately failed in Halifax, and who has been the theme of much talk, complimentary (?) and otherwise, has not left that city, as was generally supposed. He was there up to within a few days ago. His assignee is reported to have said that when James did go, he took no funds with him. It is generally hoped by his friends that, for the sake of his former pretensions to rectitude of conduct, this may be true.

It is said that Geo. S. Maclean, the late Cashier of the Merchants' Bank of Halifax, who was "pulled down" and dismissed from the service of the Bank, having been mixed up in the McDonald affair, is now in Boston. It is not known whether he has obtained employment. Maclean has been most unfortunate—more sinned against than sinning. The general expression of feeling in Halifax is one of sympathy for him. He had always borne a character for integrity.

Western Items.

(From the Journal.)

Several Indians crossed on the ice from Lennox Island to Port Hill on Monday, the 11th instant. Ice is fast making in Richmond Bay.

Sailed from Port Hill, on Friday, the 1st instant, schooner "Cypher," John M. Gallan master, for Swansea, with a cargo of 8,250 feet of deals, 1,000 feet of boards, 21 tons of hardwood, and 31,000 bushels of oats, shipped by Hon. John Yeo.

James McLellan, son of Hugh McLellan, of this town, is supposed to have either been drowned at Charlottetown one night last week, or have gone in the last trip of the American steamer to Boston. The latter is probably what has become of the young man, as we have seen nothing in the Charlottetown papers of the affair.

Thomas, Richard and John Clarke, of Hill's River, near Alberton, were lodged in the County jail here yesterday, with very serious charges against them. The former is charged with having threatened the lives of different people, while the complaint against the two latter is for attempting to set fire to their father's barn. The whole three of them, after being jailed, carried on as if they were fit subjects for the lunatic asylum, but the supposition is that they are not so crazy as they would have people believe.
